And We strictly charge and command that this Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns in Scotland, Twenty five Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to proceed on such Election,

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twenty-fixth Day of October, One thoufand feven hundred and fixty-eight, in the Ninth Year of Our Reign.
