**W**HEREAS James Earl of Morton was duly elected and returned to be One of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, to sit in the House of Peers in the present Parliament of Great Britain, and is since deceased; in order to the electing another Peer of Scotland to sit in his Room, We do, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holy Rood House in Edinburgh, on Wednesday the Twenty-first Day of December next, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and choose another Peer of Scotland, to sit and vote in the House of Peers of this present Parliament of Great Britain, in the Room of the said James

Earl of Morton, deceased, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall then be present, and of the Proxies of such as shall be absent (such Proxies being Peers) and producing a Mandate in Writing duly signed before Witnesses, and both Constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law. And the Lord Clerk Register, or such Two of the Principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their Votes, and immediately after such Election made, and duly examined, to certify the Name of the Peer so elected, and sign and attest the same in the Presence of the said Peers the Electors, and return such Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We strictly charge and command that this Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns in Scotland, Twenty-five Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to proceed on such Election.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twenty-sixth Day of October, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-eight, in the Ninth Year of Our Reign.

This Day His Majesty was pleased to invest the most Noble William Marquess of Lothian with the Ensigns of the most Ancient and most Noble Order of the Thistle.

His Majesty having signed the several Instruments for that Purpose, which were presented to the Sovereign by Robert Quarnie, Esq; Gentleman Usher of the Green Rod, (in the Absence of George Dempster, Esq; the Secretary) the Marquess of Lothian was then called into the Royal Presence, being supported on each Side by Earl Brooke Earl of Warwick, and the Duke of Argyll, two Knights of the Thistle; Mr. Brodie, Principal Herald of North Britain, (in Place of the Gentleman Usher of the Green Rod)

Rod) carrying the Sword of State. At the Entrance, a low Reverence was made; a Second about the Middle; and, on being advanced to the Sovereign, a Third. — His Lordship then kneeling down, the Herald drew the Sword, and (kneeling) delivered it to the Sovereign, who thereupon knighted his Lordship; then the Marquess having kissed His Majesty's Hand, rose up, and Green Rod administered the Oath to his Lordship; which done, Green Rod (having received the Green Ribbon with the Symbol of the Order hanging to it) presented the same (kneeling) to the Sovereign, upon a Velvet Cushion, who put the Ribbon over his Lordship's Left Shoulder, and then kneeling down, he had again the Honour of kissing His Majesty's Hand; which done, his Lordship rose up, and, making a low Reverence, withdrew.

The Ceremony was performed soon after the Levee, in His Majesty's Closet, several of the Great Officers of the Court being present.

His Majesty's Postmaster General having been pleased to establish a sufficient Number of Packet-Boats to sail between Falmouth and New York, Charles Town, and the West-India Islands, to support a regular Monthly Correspondence to and from these Kingdoms and all Parts of His Majesty's extensive Dominions in America.

**PUBLIC NOTICE** is hereby given, that the several Mails for America, upon this New Arrangement, are to be made up at this Office on Wed-

nesday the 5th of October next, and will continue to be dispatched from hence in the same Manner upon the first Wednesday in every Month.

The Mail for New York will contain the Letters for all the Provinces on the Continent of America, from Virginia Northwards. That for Charles Town will include the Letters for North and South Carolina, Georgia, and East Florida. The Letters for Pensacola and all Parts of West Florida will be forwarded from Jamaica by every Opportunity. The Mail for the West Indies will contain the Letters for Barbadoes, all the Leeward Islands, and Jamaica, from whence the Packet-Boats are, instead of proceeding to Pensacola, to return immediately to Falmouth.

Upon the Arrival of these several Mails from hence at Falmouth, the Packet-Boats are to proceed with them to Sea immediately, Wind and Weather permitting; but, if they should be unavoidably detained one or more Days, such Letters as come hither, or may be put into this Office, will be sent every Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday to Falmouth, for the Chance of the Packets under Sailing Orders, and if sailed, they will be forwarded by the next Boat in Turn.

Great Inconveniences having arisen to the Public by returning Letters for the Postage; Their Lordships, for the Accommodation of Correspondence, leave it now to the Option of the Writer to pay or not beforehand to any Part of His Majesty's Dominions either in Europe or America, except to Gibraltar or Port Mahon.

All Persons however are particularly to take Notice, that Letters and Packets from any Part of Great Britain, Ireland, or America, for all Places beyond the Seas not in His Majesty's Dominions, are to pay at the Office where they are put in, the full Post to London, besides the Foreign Rates they may be chargeable with, to prevent the Necessity of their being opened and returned for the Postage.
