*Florence, October 25.* The Great Duke having fixed on the 21st Instant for performing the Ceremony of investing Sir Horace Mann, Bart. with the Ensigns of the most Honourable Order of the Bath, Orders were issued from the Court to all the Great Officers of State, to the Chamberlains, who were near One Hundred in Number, and to all the Nobility who have the Privilege of the Antichamber, to be there at half an Hour after Eleven in the Morning, and half after Twelve was the Time appointed for Sir Horace Mann to be there. In Consequence of which, many English Noblemen and Gentlemen assembled at his House in the Morning, and proceeded with him to the Great Duke's Palace. He went in a Coach and Six with the Duke of Devonshire, the Earl Cowper, and His Britannick Majesty's Consul (who were to be Witnesses) followed by eighteen Coaches, with the Rest of the English Noblemen and Gentlemen; and, after a short Stay in the Antichamber, the Ceremony was performed in the following Manner:

The Great Duke, being in his Chamber of Audience, was seated under a Canopy of State, with his Hat on his Head, and attended by Count Rosenbergh, his Grand Maitre, First Minister, and Knight of the Golden Fleece; Count Thurn, the Captain of the Noble Guard; the Duke Salviati, Great Chamberlain; Prince Corsini, Grand Prior of the Order of Malta, and Master of the Horse; and the Marquis Riccardi, Master of the Great Wardrobe, Grand Croix of the Order of St. Stephen, and appointed Marshal of the Court on this Occasion. The Gentleman of the Bed-Chamber in Waiting then introduced the Duke of Devonshire, the Earl Cowper, and his Britannick Majesty's Consul, as Witnesses. Sir Horace Mann was then introduced, being supported on the Right Hand by the Marquis Capponi, Major General, Commander in Chief of the Troops in Florence, Gentleman of the Bed-Chamber, and Grand Croix of the Order of Stephen; and on the Left by Count de la Tour, Major General, Lieutenant of the Noble Guard, and Knight of St. Stephen. The first Page, called the Page of Honour, preceded, carrying on a Gold Salver the Ensigns of the Order of the Bath, the Book of Statutes, and the Letters Patent of Creation of a Knight of the said Order.

Sir Horace Mann, at his Entrance into the Room, as well as the two Knights on the Right and Left, made a low Reverence, a second in the Middle of the Room, and a third on ap-

proaching the Great Duke. Monsieur Sauboin, first private Secretary, who had previously been furnished with a Translation of the Patent, read the same aloud by the Great Duke's Order; which being finished, Sir Horace Mann kneeled down before the Great Duke, and the Marquis Riccardi, Marshal of the Court, delivered to His Royal Highness a drawn Sword of State, with which he touched Sir Horace Mann's Left Shoulder three Times, saying to him, "I create you a Knight in the Name of my Brother the King of Great Britain." The Page of Honour then presented to His Royal Highness the Book of the Statutes of the Order of the Bath, which he delivered to Sir Horace Mann, who, on receiving it, made the following Declaration: "I, Horace Mann, Baronet, do promise and swear to the King of Great Britain, my Master, to observe the Statutes of the most Honourable Order of the Bath, in every Point." Whereupon the same Page presented to the Great Duke the Ribbon, with the Insignia of the Order, which his Royal Highness put over the Knight's Right Shoulder, and attached the Star to his Breast, delivering to him the original Patent of Creation. He then arose; and in a short respectful Speech thanked his Royal Highness for the great Honour he had done him; then returning into the Antichamber, he signed the Oath in due Form, in the Presence of the abovementioned Witnesses, who also signed their Names.

The Great Dutchess, with the young Prince and Princess, stood behind a Curtain to see the Ceremony.

Sir Horace Mann then returned Home, all the English Gentlemen accompanying him, in the same Manner as he went to Court; and they, together with all the Great Officers, and those who assisted at the Ceremony, did him the Honour to dine with him that Day. The next Evening Sir Horace Mann gave a publick Ball to the Nobility of both Sexes; and for several Days after a Variety of Entertainments were given on this Occasion by the Great Duke and the Officers of his Court, and by the English Nobility and Gentlemen. Upon the Whole, no Ceremony of this Kind was ever performed with more Splendor and Dignity than was shewn on this Occasion.

*Lisbon, October 29.* Their most Faithful Majesties returned on Wednesday last from Mafra, in perfect Health; and his Highness the Prince of Beira is very much recovered from his late Indisposition.

*Paris, November 9.* His most Christian Majesty, and the Royal Family, are to remove from Fontainebleau on the 15th of this Instant.

Last Friday being the Anniversary of the Birth of the late King William the Third, of glorious Memory, in the Morning the Flag was displayed on Birmingham Tower: At Noon there was a splendid Appearance of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction, at the Castle, to compliment his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant: After which his Excellency, attended by the Nobility and Gentry, and escorted by a Squadron of Horse, went in Procession round the Statue of King William: The Regiments on Dublin Duty lined the Statue on each Side: And after his Excellency's Return to the Castle, the Great Guns at the Salute Battery, in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix, were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn up in College Green: And the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy. And the following Day being the Anniversary of the horrid Gunpowder Plot, the Great Guns in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks; and the Evening concluded with Illuminations, Bonfires, and other Demonstrations of Joy.

Lottery-Office, Exchequer, Nov. 3, 1768.

THE Managers and Directors of the present Lottery think proper to warn all Persons who might otherwise be drawn in to be Adventurers in any private Lotteries, here or in Ireland, that by Acts of the 8th Year of his Majesty King George the First, and the 12th and 26th Years of his late Majesty King George the Second, some or one of them, "All and every Person and Persons, who shall print, advertise, or publish Schemes or Proposals for advancing Sums of Money to be decided by the Chances of the Prizes of any publick Lottery or Lotteries, established or allowed by Act of Parliament, or deliver out Tickets to the Persons advancing such Sums to entitle them to a Share of the Money so advanced according to such Scheme or Proposal, or publish any Scheme or Proposal of the like Nature and Kind, under any Denomination, Name, or Title whatsoever, and any Person who shall sell any Chance in the present State-Lottery, or receive any Money whatsoever in Consideration of the Repayment of any Sum or Sums of Money in case any Ticket in the said Lottery shall prove fortunate, all and every such Persons being convicted on the Oath or Oaths of one or more credible Witnesses or Witnessesses, by two or more Justices of the Peace, will forfeit the several Sums of Five Hundred Pounds, and Two Hundred Pounds, as in the said Acts is expressed, over and above all former Penalties, and all and every Person or Persons who shall be Contributors to, or Adventurers in any such Sales, Lotteries, Proposals, or Schemes aforesaid, will be liable to pay the Sum of Fifty Pounds, and all other the Penalties by Act of Parliament inflicted; And the said Managers and Directors do hereby give publick Notice to all Persons whatsoever, that all Offenders against the said Acts will be prosecuted with the utmost Severity; And for the Information of the Publick they here insert two Clauses out of an Act of Parliament passed in the 8th Year of His present Majesty, viz.

"And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That no Person or Persons shall sell the Chance or Chances of any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, or any Share or Shares of any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, for a Day or Part of a Day, or for a longer Time, less than the whole Time of Drawing the Lottery then to come; or shall receive any Money whatsoever in Consideration of the Repayment of any Sum or Sums of Money, in Case any Ticket or Tickets, in the said Lottery shall prove

Fortunate; or shall lay any Wager relating to the Drawing of any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, either as to the Time of such Ticket or Tickets being drawn, or whether such Ticket or Tickets be drawn Fortunate or Unfortunate; and all and every Person and Persons, who shall offend in any of the said Matters, shall forfeit and pay treble the Sum and Sums of Money which shall have been received by such Person and Persons, contrary to the true Intent and Meaning of this Act; to be recovered by Action of Debt, Bill, Complaint, or Information, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster; in which no Essoin, Protection, Privilege, or Wager of Law, or more than one Imparlanche, shall be allowed; one Moiety whereof to be for the Use of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, and the other Moiety to be paid to the Person or Persons who shall sue for the same; and every such Sale, Wager, or Contract, and every Agreement relating thereto, shall be, and is hereby declared, null and void."

"And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That if any Person or Persons shall keep any Office or Offices, or shall print or publish any Scheme or Proposal for receiving any Sum or Sums of Money in Consideration of any Interest to be granted for the same in any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, whereof such Person or Persons shall not then be actually possessed, or in Consideration of any Sum or Sums of Money to be repayed, in Case any Ticket, or Number of Tickets, in the said Lottery, which shall not be in the actual Possession of such Person or Persons, shall prove Fortunate or Unfortunate, all and every such Person and Persons shall forfeit and pay the Sum of Five Hundred Pounds; to be recovered by Action of Debt, Bill, Complaint, or Information, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster; in which no Essoin, Protection, Wager of Law, or more than one Imparlanche, shall be allowed; one Moiety whereof to be for the Use of His Majesty, His Heirs, or Successors, and the other Moiety to be paid to the Person or Persons who shall sue for the same; and also shall suffer three Months Imprisonment without Bail or Mainprize."
