“ me an-I think Confinement is Death therefore  
“ thou Deserveſt to Dye. Charles thy Companion  
“ I will Likewise Diſpatch with many else of the  
“ Tribe Villins We have Sweward and will per-  
“ form.”

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Writing the said anonymous threatening Letter, and in Putting the same under the Door of the House of Mr. Holcombe at Bridgewater as aforesaid, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices in of the said Facts, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
