Swansey, Novemb. 29.

Madrid, Novemb. 18. Notwithstanding the great oppofition raised by several G andees and Religious persons, both in this place and at Rome, The Queen Regent hath at the last fo effectually pursued her intention, that the Pope was casily reduced, not onely to dispence with Father Jean Everhardo Nishardo, a Jesuite, her Confessor, for his Oath which would not otherwise permit him to take on him any scular employment, but has also dispatched his Bull to him Gratis, which his been lately presented him here, with a Command from his Holines in vertue of his holy Obedience, to actept the employment and charge of Inquisitor General; which accordingly he did on Saturday the 13 instant, and took the usual Oath: After which, they offered to him the customary Present of 48 Pistols for his Propitia, as they term it, which he could not be perswaded to accept, but caused them to be distributed amongst his Pages: Since that, the Queen lias bostowed on him 50000 Ducats towards the setting up his House, and establishment of his Family, which ('ris said) he will leave to the disposal of other Persons, appearing hitherto alelf-denying person, not at all to be tempted by the Grandeurs of this world: Since his entrance upon his Charge, te has received the joy and complements of all the great personmes of this Court, and the Ambassadors of Foreign Princes, in whole effects he wears the Character of a very able and facere Minister of State.

The Prince Avelino, a Neopolitzn, having made a journey hither, with an intention to marry a Daughter of the Dake de Terra NHOVA, met with some diffi ulty (as it feems) in obtaining a grant from her Majesty of something that was which having put an end to his D fign, he was preparing for his return; but upon some conseience had with Don Luis Poderico, of whom he cane to take his leave, a new Proposal was made to him to quit her Majesties grant, and in lieu thereof to accept of 100000 Ducaes in money from her Father for a portion, which he approving of, the match was immediately concluded, and the marriage folemnifed the fame day.

From Cadiz we are informed, that a Judge lately fent from hence, was there arrived to examine feveral abuses committed in the management of our Maritine affairs, and particularly in the fitting out, and victualing the Armada for this last Summers Expedition, great numbers of our men having perish by the unwholesomness of the Provisions, beli ies other great milchiefs. Upon which a count several Officers have been apon the Rick, to extore a Confession, which ('tis believed) will prove very fatal to dive s of them.

From Fangich they write, that Gapland begins again to get ground, and is much railed in his hopes upon several successful incounters he lately has had, and despairs not of reco-Vering his former Command.

The Ketch belonging to that Girison, is at present in the Harbor carrining, and will shortly to Sea again, with another Vallel of 10 Guns, and 120 menutagelie ready for service, the Vessel being a prize bought of the Turks, and may be very

From Granado wa are informed, that the Marquis de Caracene, encouraged by his former fuccels against the Portugais, is again gone out with a frong Party, intending to make lome attempts upon the Marshall de Schombergs quarters. His suc-

cels we may expect hereafter.

Umbstadt, Novemb. 22. Great hopes we have that some sew months may put an end to the differences between the two Electors Palatine and Mayence, the Deputies from the Interessed parties, having figured the Compromis, in the form prepared by the Ambassador of France and Swedeland; Yesterday was publishe a Cessasion of Armes to continue for eight months, upon which the Lorrainers have received Ocders to return home, and are accordingly upon their march, and to avoid all disorders, several persons are deputed to attend them in their Return, viz. The Signior Fricheman from the French, the Signior Spankeim from his Highness the Elector Palatine, and the Signior de Rifarcourt from the Duke of Lorrain: The Electors are likewise to disband their forces, and quietly to attend the iffue of that negotiation, which is vigorously carryed on , and will in all probability end

We are likewise informed from Nancy, that the Duke of Lorrain had received from the Count de Lilebonne, the Agreement between the two Bectors for a suspension of Armes, and Restitution of all taken on either side, for which Hostages had been reciprocally given; and that the Lorrainers being upon their March homewards, Itad Quarters assigned by that Duke, where they were to continue till the determination of the Reserrees were fully known. 'Tis said also that the two Electors are gone personally to Hailbrun, to give the greater life to that negotiation.

Hamburgh, Novemb. 27. The twenty fourth, the Treaty between the Plenipotentiaries of Sweden and Bremen was fully concluded, and to be figned the next day. The Articles in brief as follow,

1. That the City abstain from Session or Suffrage in the Assemblies of the Empire, till the year 700. with a proviso, that no prescription or prejudicial confiquence shall from hence be drawn against them; and after that time to have power to reassume their Session and Votes.

2. That the City neither feek nor defire Seffion or Vote

in the meetings of the Nether Saxon Circle.

3. That the share of that City in the Imperial contributions be carried into the Imperial Exchequer, and that they obtain of the Empe or, that 14th part be the proportion for the Countrey of the Durchy of Bremen, and till that be effected themselves are to bear that proportion.

4. In the Saxon Circular contributions, the City is to paya 14th part of the Tax of the whole Dutchy.

5. That as to the Rights and Effects of Immediateness, and the Territorial Right, and Court of Borghvells, the City shall remain undisturbed in their postession, according to the agreement at Staden, until some other expedient be found out by consent. That the City may repair their Land defences as formerly; but the fortifications added to the Waert-Tower, and Catten-Tower, &c. are after the conclufion of the Treaty to be thrown down.

6. That the works of the Ci y wall built upon his Majesties ground shall upon a pecition in writing, presented by the Burgomafters and Councel, be suffered to continue, That they perition likewise for his Majesties Pardon sor displeasures done to him before the troubles; and if a future Enlargement of their fortifications shall be thought necessary, in which his

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Majesties grounds may be concerned, that they exhibit a Peririon for his Majesties leave.

7. That the City shall not use the Title of a free Imperial City, and that the King and his Officers use these words to the City, viz. The City of Bremen, and Require.

8. That the King suffer the City peaceably to enjoy all its Priviledge, Rights, Freedoms, and Gustoms, Ecclesia-stical and Civil, according to the Instrument of Peace, Anno 1548. with freedom from Toils and other Immunities.

9. All Dimages and offences occasioned by the War, to be pardoned and forgotten, and pritoners mutually exchanges without Ransom.

10. All things (not now changed) to remain as in the Treaty of Staden 1654.

fix. That the City (after Ratification of this Treaty) shall do homage after the form prescribed in the second Article of the Treaty at Staden unto the King, as Duke of Bremen.

12 That if any disputes arile, no hostilities shall be used but all things amicably composed in a meeting to be called thereupon.

13. That after the figning of the agreement, the fiege be railed, and Trade and Commerce restored, &c.

14. That his Majetties Ratification be exhibited in three months.

15. That the City of Bremen may defire the Ratification of his Enperial Majesty, which is not to derogate from the Instrument of Peace.

Copenhagen, Novemb. 13. On the 31 past, a sudden fire brake out in this Gity with such violence, that it seemed to threaten it with great danger; but by his Majesties care, such timely order was taken, that with the advantage of a showre of rain, which alaid the violence of the wind, the fire was ex inguisht with the loss only of sour or five Houses.

Our Men of War are still crusing about Gottenberg, under the command of Admiral Helt, and his given out, that Admiral Adelaer is to be speedily sent out with a Squadron to defend the Coasts against the English Ships that frequently ply upon them.

From Stockholm we are advised, that the Count Magnus de la Garde, Brother to the High Chancellor, the Birons Gustavas Spar and Guldenstern, and the Sieur Helmstet, Mister of the Ordnance,, are named Senators in the vacant places.

ALL persons concerned are to take notice. That the School of the Colledge near Winchester, was opened on the First of December instant, it having pleased God to extinguish, in all humane appearance, the Sickness in that City, and the Suburbs thereof.

Paris, Decemb. t. His Majesty having notice given him that the Mulquetiers, Light-Hote, and other Companies of his Guards were frequently absent from their quarters, up in several pretences, by which they got leave from their Officers, hath for prevention of this inconveniency, commanded that for the surre no pay shall be allowed to any of them for the times of their absence.

The Ira leimen living about the Palais, the Rue ct. Denis, and these parts of the City having notice of the design of the Chambre dela Police in reforming the Streets, and reducing the Shops and Houses to their just bounds, have offered 30000 Crowns to his Mijesty, on condition that no alteration may be made upon them.

'Tis here discoursed that his Majesty is resolved to send an Ambassador to the Dake of Savoy, to endeavor an accommedation between that Duke, and the City of Geneva; the greatest puts of the Swisse Cantons, being (as 'tis said) resolved upon a Neutrality.

Hague, Novemb. 30. The Deputies of the Admiralties having lately had conference with the Deputies from the States about the Maritine affairs, have cast up the number of their fleet designed for the next 'ummers service, which they intend shall consist of 72 Men of War; one half of them to carry from 60 to 80 Guns, and from 300 to 500 men, bessels 12 Fregats from 24 to 30 Guns, with 24 Fiteships and

12 Advice-Yatchts. Towards which the Admiralties require the sum of 126 Tuns of Gold, which is conceived will prove a matter of great difficulty, considering the complaints of many of the Provinces.

Edenburgh, Novemb. 24. Yesterday the General marched out from Glasgow in search of the Mutiniers, sending out Lieutenant General Drummond with a party of 200 Horse, and 100 Dragoons, to discover their number and posture, but met with no opposition; the rabble, it seems, retiring in a consused body without any order, being not at all sounded into any Military posture, in a sew days our forces will be able to give a better account of them.

Upon a false allarum of the appearance of some Vessels in the Frith, the Countrey shewed themselves very active and ready for the service of their Countrey, and seem very zealous against the Mutiniers.

The leveral Councies are now putting into a Military poflure under their respective Sheriffs.

This day the Shire of Mid Lowthian Rendezvouzed at Leith, where there appeared a body of 500 good Horse. The Colledge of Instice making up the like number. Order is likewife taken for the security of Leith Harbor, by planning Guns upon the Cittadel, and other convenient places.

Carlisle, Novemb. 26. This day arrived Ceptain Johnson from the Earl of Anandale, whom he left at the Kirk of Dary in Galloway, with a confiderable number of Genty. He had not then met with any of the Mutiniers, onely some of their Scours had fired one upon another, but without any hurt done. Himself according to his Orders, expecting the arrival of the General, was returning to Sanker, about 16 miles from Dumfreege.

From a person of Galloway, who on Thursday last, was amongst the Mutiniers at Dary, we have this account of them, That they have no person of quality amongst them, except onely the Laird of Barscot, who led them formerly to Dungsteeze; that they have three Ministers with them, viz. Simple, Fleshier, and Welsh, who that day preached to them at Dary; the number being then as he guessed about 1500, and very sew of them armed: That the Ministers encouraging them, in conclusion told them, That if any of them were fraid, they should draw off from them; which advice he sw sollowed by 200 of that Rabble, who immediately deserted them.

The Lor's have order to return to their own shires for the better lecurity of them, and to continue there till surther order from the General.

Whitchal, Decemb. 1. Yesterday by Letters from the Barbadoes we received advice, that his Excellency the Lord Willoughby, His Majesties G wernor of the Caribbee Islands, having equipped at the Barbadoes a considerable fleet of ships of all forts, well manned and victualled, had, himfelf taking the command of them, fet fail thence the 18 of July laft towards the Leeward In inds, in order to some particular delign; that in his way, on the 23 to the Leeward of Martineta, he met with two good prizes; and at the same time, having notice given him of two other confiderable ships of the enemies richly laden, that were then in the Harbor at the Los Santes, he forthwith commanded some of his ships to attempt the taking or destroying of them, which was accordingly estelled the 26 with much resolution: One of them being brought of prize, and the other burnt in the Harbor. Which done, his Lordship pursuing his farther defign, there suddenly arose to violent a Hurricana, that their Cables giving way, they were forced to abanden themselves to the rage of the form, which continued with that extremity, that they were wholly leptrated and disperst; and, we sear, not without much los, though we know not yet all the particulars. Several ships amongst which, the Admiral himself in one, are yet milling, but, we hope, they may have faved themselves to the Leeward: The Rear Admiral with three or four others are life in Montsferrar. This storm, as it unhappily disappointed the Lord Willoughby in the defiza he had formed, lo itfell with no less severity upon the French in those parts; all ther ships (three or sour of which were Men of War of some force) together with their Sloops and other Veffels having ben cast away."
