Congé d'Elire to the Arch-Deacon and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Landaff, empowering them to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being vacant by the Translation of the Right Reverend Father in God, Dr. John Ewer, late Bishop thereos, to the See of Bangor; and also a Letter, recom-mending unto the said Arch-Deacon and Chapter the Reverend Jonathan Shipley, Doctor in Di-vinity, Dean of the Cathedral Church of Winchester, to be by them elected Bishop of the hid See of Landaff.
