THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molineux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for amending and further continuing an Act of the Sixth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act to amend, and render more effectual, in His Majesty's Dominions in America, an Act passed in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

An Act for raising Money to discharge Debts contracted for re-building the Parish Church and Tower of Saint Nicholas in the City of Bristol; and to re-build the Spire, and complete the said Church; and for other Purposes.

An Act to rebuild the Shire-Hall of the County of Nottingham; and for using the Guild-Hall of the Town and County of the Town of Nottingham, for the Purposes of a Shire-Hall, in the mean Time.

An Act for enabling His Majesty to license a Playhouse in the City of York, and in the Town and County of the Town of Kingston upon Hull.

An Act for repairing and widening several Roads in the Counties of Montgomery, Merioneth, and Salop.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road, from the End of the Turnpike Road in Shawbury in the County of Salop, to Drayton in Hales in the said County; and from thence to Newcastle under Line in the County of Stafford; and from Shawbury aforesaid, to the Turnpike Road in High Ercell

in the said County of Salop; and from Shawbury aforesaid, to Wem in the said County; and from thence to the Turnpike Road in Sandford in the said County.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of two Acts passed in the Tenth Year of King George the First, and the Sixteenth Year of His late Majesty, for repairing the Road from the North Part of Harlow Bush Common, in the Parish of Harlow, to Woodford, in the County of Essex.

An Act to continue, and render more effectual, several Acts passed in the Sixth and Twelfth Years of King George the First, and the Twenty-eighth Year of His late Majesty, for repairing the Roads from Stevenage in the County of Hertford, to Biggleswade in the County of Bedford, and other Roads therein mentioned; and for repairing and widening the Road from Radwell Corner, to the Turnpike Road at Arlesey, in the County of Bedford.

An Act to repair and widen the Road, from the Broken Cross in Macclesfield, in the County of Chester, over the Long Moss, and Monks Heath, to the Turnpike Road in Nether Tabley, in the said County; and for turning and exchanging Part of the said Road.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road, from the City of Norwich, to Scolt Bridge, in the County of Norfolk.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from Scolt Bridge, to the Place where the East Gate lately stood, in the Town of Bury St. Edmund's, in the County of Suffolk.

An Act for amending the Road from Bishopsgate Bridge in the City of Norwich, to a Stone, formerly called the Two Mile Stone, where the Norwich Road joins the Caister Causeway, Two Miles and a Half short of the Town of Great Yarmouth.

An Act for repairing and widening several Roads, leading to and through the Borough of Bodmin, in the County of Cornwall.

And to Sixteen Private Bills.

 A PROCLAMATION,
 For the Suppressing Riots, Tumults, and Unlawful
 Assemblies.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS it has been represented to Us, that divers dissolute and disorderly Persons have most riotously and unlawfully assembled themselves together, to the Disturbance of the publick Peace; and have, in a most daring and audacious Manner, assaulted several Merchants and others coming to Our Palace at St. James's, and have committed many Acts of Violence and Outrage before the Gates of Our Palace; and that these Acts of Violence have been accompanied with Threats of a most dangerous Kind; We, taking the same into Our most serious Consideration, and being resolved to suppress all such tumultuous Riots and Disorders, tending to the Disturbance of the Publick Peace, and to the

Endangering of all Order and Government, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby strictly charging and commanding the Lord Mayor, and the Justices of the Peace of Our City of London, and the Justices of the Peace of Our City and Liberties of Westminster, and Borough of Southwark, and of the Counties of Middlesex and Surry, that they do use their utmost Endeavours to prevent and suppress all Riots, Tumults, and unlawful Assemblies; and to put in due and strict Execution the Laws and Statutes made for preventing, and for the more speedy and effectual suppressing and punishing the same; and that all Our loving Subjects be aiding and assisting therein.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twenty-second Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-nine, in the Ninth Year of Our Reign.

GOD save the KING.
