**A PROCLAMATION,**  
*For the Suppressing Riots, Tumults, and Unlawful Assemblies.*

GEORGE R.

**W**HEREAS it has been represented to Us, that divers dissolute and disorderly Persons have most riotously and unlawfully assembled themselves together, to the Disturbance of the publick Peace; and have, in a most daring and audacious Manner, assaulted several Merchants and others coming to Our Palace at St. James's, and have committed many Acts of Violence and Outrage before the Gates of Our Palace; and that these Acts of Violence have been accompanied with Threats of a most dangerous Kind; We, taking the same into Our most serious Consideration, and being resolved to suppress all such tumultuous Riots and Disorders, tending to the Disturbance of the Publick Peace, and to the Endangering of all Order and Government, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby strictly charging and commanding the Lord Mayor, and the Justices of the Peace of Our City of London, and the Justices of the Peace of Our City and Liberties of Westminster, and Borough of Southwark, and of the Counties of Middlesex and Surry, that they do use their utmost Endeavours to prevent and suppress all Riots, Tumults, and unlawful Assemblies; and to put in due and strict Execution the Laws and Statutes made for preventing, and for the more speedy and effectual suppressing and punishing the same; and that all Our loving Subjects be aiding and assisting therein.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twenty-second Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-nine, in the Ninth Year of Our Reign.

**W**HILST we feel ourselves happy in the Enjoyment of every Right and Privilege, secured to us by the Laws and Constitution of our Country, we cannot observe, without the utmost Regret, a Spirit of Licentiousness, Sedition, and Riot prevailing amongst some of your Majesty's Subjects, whereby you are disturbed in the Seat of your Government, and the Security of the Kingdom in general most daringly attacked.

In vain do these Disturbers of the Public Tranquillity call the sacred Name of Liberty to their Aid. At that glorious Era, when our Forefathers struggled for the Establishment of their lawful Rights and Privileges, they considered their Freedom to be secure only by the Establishment of Laws and regular Government; and therefore we their Posterity must unanimously condemn the Attempts of those, who, under this deluding and false Pretence, indulge themselves in the Prosecution of Measures subversive of all Government, and consequently destructive of all Liberty.

Prompted as well by Loyalty and Affection to your Majesty's Person, as by Regard to the Dignity and Honour of your Reign, we embrace this Opportunity of expressing our Indignation at every Attempt to weaken the Force of lawful Authority; and of assuring your Majesty of our most fervent Resolution to support your Royal Wisdom and Prudence in the Exertion of such Measures as may be necessary for effectually securing the Public Tranquility and the Stability of Government.

**F**ILLED with a grateful Sense of the Blessings this Nation has enjoyed under your Majesty's just

just and mild Administration, (of which the Trade of this commercial Place has felt the happy Influence) we beg Leave to represent to your Majesty, that we cannot hear your Government so insolently maligned, nor see a Torrent of Sedition, so violent and rapid as to endanger the Overthrow of our Civil and Religious Rights, without expressing our utmost Abhorrence on so alarming an Occasion.

Nothing but a Faction of Licentiousness, under the Mask of Liberty, would attempt to weaken the Cement of your People's Duty and Affection to your Majesty, and to relax the Sinews of your Government, by misconstruing the Proceedings of your Parliament, and groundlessly diminishing the Authority of your Courts of Justice, which in no Age were more uprightly or ably filled.

By the Outrages they have so daringly committed, these Enemies of their Country, at the same Time they are undermining the Foundation of our excellent Constitution, are rashly attempting the Destruction of that valuable Privilege they profess for their Object; of which your Majesty's Subjects have had the full Fruition during your auspicious Reign.

When your Majesty's Peace has been so insolently disturbed, and the Distribution of Justice so daringly impeded, (though void of all Foundation in Reason or Policy) our Attachment to your sacred Person, and Regard for our happy Constitution, impel us thus to approach your Majesty, to express our Apprehensions, that these Invasions of the Publick Tranquility, may be productive of the greatest Evils to the State, and, if not timely restrained, be attended with most dangerous Consequences to the Community.

Firmly confiding in your Majesty's Wisdom, that such prudent, just and seasonable Measures will be taken, as may tend to re-establish due Order and Obedience among your Subjects, and stop the Progress of these factious Combinations; and fully convinced, that every Thing valuable to us is inseparably connected with the Stability of your Majesty's Government, we are resolved, at the Risque of our Lives and Fortunes, to second your Majesty's Efforts to discountenance and repel these Disorders, which must needs disturb the Repose of your Majesty's Reign, and affect the Interest and Prosperity of your Kingdoms.

The King has been pleased to grant His Royal Licence to Richard Monins, Clerk, A. M. Rector of Ringwood in Kent, to assume and take the Name of Eaton, in Compliance with the Will of Dame Catherine Thompson, deceased.

St. James's, March 30, 1769.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That a French Ship, called *La Concorde*, Dominique Berthe, Master, bound from Barcelona to Calais, having been lately stranded near St. Donats in the County of Glamorgan, was robbed and plundered by the Country People, and at length totally destroyed, notwithstanding the Endeavours of the neighbouring Magistrates to prevent it; and that Nine of the said Magistrates, in order to express, in a Writing signed by them, to the Earl of Plymouth, Lord Lieutenant of the said County, their just Abhorrence of an Outrage so subversive of Justice and Humanity, and so ignominious to their Country, and to prevent the like atrocious Practices for the Future, did, on the 14th Day of this Instant March, (in Consequence of an Adjournment) meet at the Bear Inn in the Town of Cowbridge in the said County of Glamorgan, to consult about the most effectual Means for bringing the principal Offenders to condign and exemplary Punishment, but could not then learn who the said principal Offenders were: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the said principal Offenders, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon, and likewise a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to any one of them, who shall discover the Rest of the said principal Offenders in the said atrocious Acts above-mentioned, or any Two or more of them, so that they, or any of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof; and also the same Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person, not an Accomplice in the said wicked Crimes, who shall discover those principally concerned therein, so that they, or any of them, may be apprehended and convicted as aforesaid: The said Reward, in either Case, to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury upon the Conviction of any one or more of the said principal Offenders.
