Westminster, May 1.

THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, the Earl of Marchmont, and several other Lords therein mentioned, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to,*

An Act to continue certain Laws therein mentioned, for granting, for a limited Time, a Liberty to carry Rice from His Majesty's Provinces of South and North Carolina and Georgia, directly to any Part of America to the Southward of the said Provinces, subject to the like Duty as is now paid on the Exportation of Rice from the said Colonies to Places in Europe situate to the Southward of Cape Finisterre.

An Act to permit the Inhabitants of Jersey and Guernsey, to export directly from thence, to Newfoundland, or the British Colonies in America, Goods necessary for the Fishery, under certain Restrictions; and to import from thence non-enumerated Goods (except Rum), and to land the same in the said Islands.

An Act for the more effectual Punishment of such Persons, as shall demolish, or pull down, burn, or otherwise destroy or spoil, any Mill or Mills; and for preventing the destroying or damaging of Engines, for draining Collieries and Mines, or Bridges, Waggon Ways, or other Things, used in conveying Coals, Lead, Tin, or other Minerals from Mines, or Fences for inclosing Lands in Pursuance of Acts of Parliament.

An Act for repealing so much of an Act passed in the Tenth Year of her late Majesty Queen Anne, as relates to the Harbour Moorings of the Royal Navy; and for the more effectual Preservation of such Harbour Moorings, and Punishment of Persons guilty of Stealing or Embezzling His Majesty's Naval Stores, or of Forgery, or Perjury, in relation to Seamen's Wages.

An Act for the more effectual Relief of the Poor, in the County of Devon.

An Act for paving, cleansing, lighting, and watching, the High-Streets and Lanes, in the Parish of St. Nicholas, within the City of Rochester, and Parish of Strood, in the County of Kent; and for making a Road through Star Lane, across certain Fields adjoining thereto, to Chatham Hill, in the said County.

An Act for laying open and widening certain Ways and Passages within the Town of Birmingham; and for cleansing and lighting the Streets, Lanes, Ways, and Passages there; and for removing and preventing Nuisances and Obstructions therein.

An Act for building a Bridge at Worcester, over the River Severn, and for opening convenient Avenues to the said Bridge.

An Act for building a Chapel at Plymouth Dock, in the Parish of Stoke Damerell, in the County of Devon.

An Act for the establishing and well-governing an Hospital, for the Reception, Maintenance, and Employment

of Penitent Prostitutes; and for extinguishing the Right of Common, of and in certain Lands in St. George's Fields in the County of Surrey.

An Act for repairing the Roads leading from the Turnpike Road in Tring, in the County of Hertford, through Dunstable, Hitchin, Baldock, and Royston, to the Turnpike Road, at or near Bourn Bridge, and from the West End of Wellbury, to the Turnpike Road at the South End of Barton, in the Counties of Hertford, Bucks, Bedford, and Cambridge.

An Act to continue and render more effectual an Act passed in the Thirtieth Year of his late Majesty, for repairing the Road from Hitchin, in the County of Hertford, through Shefford, to the Turnpike Road from St. Alban's, to Bedford, and other Roads therein mentioned; and for repairing and widening the Road from Shefford Way Post, to the Turnpike Road at Henlow, in the County of Bedford.

An Act for repairing the Road from Stoney Stratford, in the County of Bucks, through the Towns of Buckingham and Bicester, to the Town of Woodstock, in the County of Oxford.

An Act for making a Road, from the South End of Black-Friars Bridge, to the present Turnpike Road cross St. George's Fields, and from thence to some Place at or near the House called the Dog and Duck, and to Newington Butts, in the County of Surrey; and for empowering the Trustees for carrying into Execution an Act passed in the Twenty-fourth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty, to repair, light, and watch the said Roads, when made.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of Two Acts, passed in the Third and Twenty-second Years of his late Majesty, for repairing the several Roads leading into the City of Hereford; and for amending the Roads to Lancloudy Hill and Langua Bridge.

An Act to explain, amend, and render more effectual, an Act passed in the Twenty-seventh Year of King George the Second, for repairing and widening the Road, from Leicester to Narborough, and from Leicester to Coventry, and from thence, through Kenilworth, to Warwick, and other Roads, and for other Purposes in the said Act mentioned, so far as the same relates to the Road from the Borough of Leicester to the Town of Narborough, and from Leicester to Hinckley, in the County of Leicester.

An Act to amend an Act of the fifth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for repairing and widening the Road from Tonbridge to Maidstone, and from Wats Cross to Cowden, in the County of Kent, so far as the same relates to the Repair of the Road from Wats Cross to Cowden; and for repairing the Roads leading from Seven-oaks Common to Crookhurst-Hatch-Corner, and from Pershurst Town to Southborough, in the said County.

An Act to continue and render more effectual Two Acts, for amending several Roads, leading from the City of Exeter; and for repairing and widening several other Roads therein mentioned; and for rebuilding or repairing Exe Bridge, and making the Avenues leading thereto more commodious; and for building a Bridge over the River Exe, at or near Countess Wear, in the County of Devon.

An Act for repealing so much of Two several Acts of Parliament, made and passed in the Seventeenth and Twenty-eighth Years of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Second, as relate to the Road from the End of the County of Stafford, in the Post Road towards the City of Chester, through Moor, in the County of Salep, to Nantwich, in the County of Chester, and from

from Nantwich to Tarporley, and from thence to Tarwin, in the said County of Chester, to the said City of Chester; and for more effectually repairing, widening, and suppling, the Jame Road; and also for repairing and widening the Road from Northwich, in the said County of Chester, to the Cross in Tarwin aforesaid.

The two following Addresses have been presented to His Majesty by Lord Frederick Campbell, being introduced by the Lord of His Majesty's Bed-Chamber in Waiting: Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and faithful Subjects, the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Freeholders, and Heritors of the County of Renfrew, highly sensible of the important Blessings we derive from our happy Constitution of Government; convinced, from every Act of your Majesty's mild and beneficent Administration, that you make the Laws, upon which that Constitution is founded, the inviolable Rule of your Conduct; and the Happiness of your People the constant Object of your Royal Care; we look up, with Gratitude and Affection, to your Majesty, as the great Protector and Guardian of all our Civil and Religious Rights.

Impressed with these just Sentiments of constitutional Loyalty, we see, with Surprise and Indignation, the daring Attempts that have been made to disturb the Publick Tranquillity, and to subvert the Authority of your Government. A dangerous Spirit of Sedition has been artfully infused into Numbers of your Majesty's Subjects in the Capital, which has led them, unprovoked by any real or pretended Grievance, to commit repeated Acts of Violence upon their Fellow-Subjects; to arraign and obstruct the legal Proceedings of Justice; and audaciously to offer Insult to every Branch of the Legislature.

We trust in the Wisdom and Vigilance of your Majesty's Government, that, by a firm Exertion of the Power of the Laws, an End will be put to those criminal Excesses; and that Good Order and Subordination will be re-established in the State.

We humbly beg Leave to assure your Majesty of our inviolable Attachment to your Royal Person; and that we will, with as warm a Zeal, support the Rights and Dignity of your Crown, as we would assert the most valuable and distinguished of our national Privileges; conscious that upon either equally depend the Prosperity and Liberties of our Country.

The humble Address of the Magistrates and Town Council of Paisley.

WE your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful Subjects, the Magistrates and Town Council of Paisley, in Common Council assembled, beg Leave to express our most zealous Attachment to your Majesty's Royal Person, Family, and Government.

We feel much on Account of that unhappy Spirit of Licentiousness, Riot, and Disorder, which has so long prevailed in and about the Seat of Government, and in some recent Instances, near the Royal Residence, in direct Violation of every Rule of Decency, Law, and Order.

We are truly sorry to observe with what insidious Pains and Industry that factious Temper has been excited and kept up among such Numbers of our Fellow-Subjects; and that, in Defiance and Contempt of the best-regulated Government, perhaps on Earth, and in Face of the Authority of the best of Sovereigns; whilst the sacred Name of Liberty has been basely prostituted in Vindication of it.

We therefore, with the utmost Sincerity, beg Leave to express our Abhorrence and Detestation of

all such Practices; and humbly to assure your Majesty, that we shall ever be ready to support your Authority and Government, at the Hazard of our Lives and Fortunes, and in every Thing to demean ourselves as dutiful and loyal Subjects.

It is our most sincere and ardent Wish, that your Majesty may reign, through a long Course of Years, blessed with the Increase of every publick and domestic Felicity, and supported by the united and uninterrupted Obedience of all your Majesty's Subjects.

Leighorn, April 17. On Saturday the 15th Instant the Emperor and his Royal Highness the Great Duke arrived here about One o'Clock, attended by Count Dietrichin, Count Nostiz, Baron Reischach, and Count Rosenberg. Immediately after, the Governor of the Town sent Word to Sir John Dick, His Majesty's Consul, that his Imperial Majesty and the Great Duke intended, as soon as as they had dined, to go on board his Majesty's Frigates the Montreal, Capt. Cosby, and the Carysfort, Capt. Vandeput, which were then in the Roads; of which the Consul informed the Commanders, and soon after went himself on board the Montreal, which Capt. Cosby had got under Sail, and was standing close in towards the Shore. His Imperial Majesty and the Great Duke were conducted in Barges on board the Montreal. They were saluted by each of the Frigates with Twenty-one Guns, as well on their going on board, as at their Return. They continued on board the Montreal two Hours, during which Time she kept under Sail. On passing the Carysfort, she likewise got under Sail, and accompanied the Montreal. The Emperor and the Great Duke both expressed great Satisfaction. The Great Duke did Sir John Dick the Honour to present him to the Emperor; and the next Morning Sir John had the Honour to present Capt. Cosby and Capt. Vandeput to his Imperial Majesty.
