At the Court at St. James's, the 26th Day of May, 1769,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to permit the Free Impotation of certain Raw Hides and Skins from Ireland and the British Plantations in America, for a limited Time; and for taking off the Duties upon Seal Skins tanned or tawed in this Kingdom, and for granting another Duty in Lieu thereof; for indemnifying all Persons with respect to advising or executing any of His Majesty's Orders of Council prohibiting the Impotation of Raw Hides, Horns and Hoofs of Infected Cattle; and to authorize the Prohibition of the Impotation of such Hides, Horns and Hoofs for the Future," His Majesty is empowered, from Time to Time, as often as he shall find it necessary so to do, by His Royal Proclamation to be issued by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, or by His Order in Council to be published in the London Gazette, to prohibit generally, or from any particular Country or Countries, the Impotation of any Hides or Skins, Horns or Hoofs, or any other Part of any Cattle or Beast, into the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, for such Time or Times to be therein mentioned, and under such Rules, Orders and Regulations as His Majesty, by the Advice aforesaid, shall judge most expedient and effectual to prevent any Contagious Distemper from being brought into these Kingdoms.—And whereas His Majesty hath received Information, that the Contagious Distemper continues to rage amongst the Horned Cattle with great Violence in the Dominions of the Kings of Denmark and Sweden, in the Dutchies of Holstein, Mecklenburg and Cleves, in the Neighbourhood of Hamburg, and upon the Frontiers of the United Provinces, and also within the United Provinces:—His Majesty taking the same into His Royal Consideration, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to prohibit the Impotation of any Hides of Horned Cattle, either Raw or Salted, or Horns and Hoofs, from the Places aforementioned, into the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, until His Majesty's Pleasure shall be further signified. And His Majesty is further pleased, with the Advice aforesaid, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the utmost Care be taken not to permit any Entry to be made for the Hides of Horned Cattle, either Raw or Salted, or Horns and Hoofs, which are already or may hereafter be brought from the Places aforementioned, directly or indirectly, into any of the Parts of Great Britain or Ireland, until His Majesty's Pleasure shall be further signified.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lord Lieutenant of His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

The humble Address of the Provost, Magistrates and Town Council of the City of St. Andrew's, in Common Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WHILE we, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, feel the happy Effects of your Majesty's Government, founded on the most Constitutional Principles, and are animated with a lively Gratitude for your Majesty's constant and inviolable Attachment thereto, it is with the utmost Concern and Abhorrence we see such a Spirit of Licentiousness, Riot, and Sedition prevailing in your Majesty's Capital, to the great Disturbance of the Publick Peace and Tranquillity, and tending to destroy all Subordination to lawful Authority.

We take this Opportunity to express our most firm Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Family, our sincerest and warmest Wishes for the Happiness and Prosperity of your Majesty's Government, and our determined Resolutions to support the same with our Lives and Properties; in the full Assurance that your Majesty in your Wisdom will take such solid Measures as will effectually put a Stop to that Spirit of Sedition, so artfully fomented and propagated, by various Orders of selfish and designing Men, under the sacred Name of Liberty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

THE audacious, but we hope vain Attempts of desperate Men to disturb the Quiet of Government under the best of Princes, and to trample upon the Laws of the Land with false and specious Pretences of supporting Liberty, which can only tend to mislead the Ignorant, and to encourage the Seditious, call upon us to express our most ardent Wishes for the restoring of Publick Tranquillity, and for the Establishment of that legal Authority, which is the only sure Support of the State, and of our happy Constitution.

Animated therefore by a true Sense of our Duty, and prompted by the warmest Affection to our King and Country, we declare our Abhorrence of the Authors of the late Disorders; and we assure your Majesty of our most fervent Zeal in Support of your wise and salutary Regulations for putting an effectual Stop to Licentiousness and Riot in your Capital; and for restoring good Order and Obedience to the Laws in every Part of your extensive Empire.
