St. James's, July 29, 1769.

It having been humbly represented to the King, that on Tuesday Night the 11th Instant, about Midnight, some evil-disposed Person or Persons did maliciously get into the Windows of the Dwelling-House of Mr. William Wason, of Kirton in the County of Lincoln, and discharged two Guns, charged with large Shot, which enterea two separate Rooms; also, that the same Night, or early the next Morning, it is supposed the same Person, having left behind them, upon the Road near Mr. Wason's House, a Bag with large Shot in it, and afterwards shoot into the Dwelling-House of Mr. John Turnard, of Frampton in the said County, with Guns loaded with Pebbles, by which the Windows of two adjacent Rooms were broken; for the Apprehension and Conviction of which said Offender or Offenders Mr. Wason hath offered a Reward of One Hundred Pounds. That on Thursday Morning the 12th Instant, between the Hours of One and Two o'Clock, two Persons fired two Guns, at the same Time loaded with large Shot, into the Windows of the Dwelling-House of Mr. Robert Barlow, of Boston in the said County, which passed into two separate Rooms; and it is supposed the said Persons left the under-written Paper, which was found the same Morning, near the Place from which the Guns were discharged.

"Mr. Barlow as you have been one of the Head Injurers concerning hollandfen, and you used the utmost of your power in getting the Rogish

The under-written Letter was sent by Post from Scalding Post-Office, and directed to Mr. Robert Barlow, Goat Street, Boston, and received by him on the 26th Day of January, 1767.

"You a promoter of the Villenly Design of in closing it are Determed, in a few Days after ye Act are signd either by Day or night at home or a brode to have your Blood."

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Firing the said Guns, or Writing the said Letters, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplices in the said Facts, (except the Person or Persons who actually wrote the said Letters, or either of them) so that they, or any of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
