Copenhagen, July 25.

ON Thursday the 20th Instant the Court removed from Fridericksberg to this Place; on the same Day their Danish Majesties, accompanied by his Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester, made an Excursion to see the Castle of Cronnenbourg at Elfseneer, and returned in the Evening on Board a Man of War, which had fallen down for that Purpose.

On Friday Four Regiments of this Garrison performed their Manœuvres before his Royal Highness, and at Night Count Moltke had the Honor of giving him, and their Danish Majesties, a Ball and Supper at his House.

Saturday the 22d was the Anniversary of the Queen's Birth-Day, which not having been observed since her Majesty's Arrival in these Dominions, by reason of the King of Denmark's Absence, his Majesty was determined to celebrate it with as much Magnificence as possible. The Court testified its Joy upon this Occasion by a very numerous and brilliant Appearance; and after their Danish Majesties had received the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers, Nobility, &c. the Honor of the Blue Ribband was conferred upon Count Reventlow, M. Rosencrantz Minister of the Council, and Count Larewig; That of the White, on Six other Persons of some Distinction; and the Key of Chambellan to Three more. In the Evening followed a Succession of new Entertainments at the Court Theatre, designed and executed purposely in Honor of her Majesty; and the Day's Festivity was closed with a great Supper at the King's Table.

On Monday began the Second Act of this Festival. At Six o'Clock in the Evening his Majesty and the Noblemen, who performed a Part in the Caroussel, richly habited in Turkish Dresses, and upon Horses finely caparisoned, set out in grand Procession through the City, attended by the Horse Guards and a large Band of Martial Musick. At Seven the Procession returned to the Great Area of the Palace, and as soon as the Noblemen, appointed Judges, had taken their Seats, the Exhibition began; one Quadrille being led by the King, the other by Count Ahlesfeld, Governor of the City. The whole Ceremony was very magnificent, and performed with the utmost Address and good Order, in the Presence of her Danish Majesty, the Queen-Mother, his Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester, the whole Court, and several Thousand Spectators: The Performance concluded soon after Nine, and was succeeded by an elegant Supper and Ball. The Court returns this Evening to Fridericksberg, where there is a grand Firework to be played off; the whole Gardens are to be illuminated; and, after a magnificent Supper in a large Building erected for that Purpose, a Masquerade Ball is intended; to which 2000 Persons are to be admitted. It is a Circumstance very favourable to all these Entertainments, that the Weather is uncommonly fine.

Homburg, July 25. His Serene Highness Prince Charles of Hesse Cassel, with her Royal Highness his Consort, arrived Yesterday Evening at Altona in perfect Health; and this Forenoon a Deputation was sent out thither from the Senate of this City, to congratulate their Royal and Serene Highnesses upon their happy Arrival in this Neighbourhood. The Prince intends to stay at Altona till Thursday, when his Serene Highness will set out from thence with

his Royal Consort for Sleswick, to take upon him the Government of the Duchies of Sleswick and Holstein, whereof he is Stadtholder.

Bonn, July 27. This Morning the Elector of Cologne set out for Arenberg in the Duchy of Westphalia, where the Diet is now assembled; His Electoral Highness, after a short Stay, will go to Munster, and remain there till November, when he proposes returning to this Residence.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that, on Thursday the 27th Day of July last, in the Night, some evil-disposed Person or Persons unlawfully and maliciously shot into the Dwelling-House of Mr. John Yerburgh, at Frampton in the County of Lincoln, with a Gun, or other Fire-Arms, loaded with Sluggs, which damaged the said House; and that a threatening Letter was afterwards found in the Court-Yard of the said House, (supposed to have been dropt or left there by the said Person or Persons); which contained the Words and Letters following, viz.

“ John Yar Brah this is to let you know that
“ As you have used the Utmost of your power to
“ persuade your Neighbours and knaves like your
“ Self to Cheat the Poor of their Right Except a
“ Reformation is heard of in the neighborhood that
“ is but the begiuing of Sorow (from your frind
“ and wel wisher to Liberty & an open fen for
“ Ever”

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Firing the said Gun, or other Fire-Arms, loaded with Sluggs as above-mentioned, into the said Dwelling-house, or in Writing the said threatening Letter, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Facts, (except the Person or Persons who actually fired the said Gun, or other Fire-Arms, loaded with Sluggs as aforesaid, into the Dwelling-House of the said John Yerburgh, or the Person or Persons who actually dropped the aforesaid Letter in the Court Yard) so that they, or any of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a farther Encouragement, the said John Yerburgh doth hereby promise a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person or Persons making such Discovery as aforesaid, (except as before excepted) to be paid by him on the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders.

It having been humbly represented to the King, that on Tuesday Night the 11th Instant, about Midnight, some evil-disposed Person or Persons did maliciously shoot into the Windows of the Dwelling-House of Mr. William Watson, of Kirton in the County of Lincoln, with Guns, charged with large Shot, which enterea two separate Rooms; also, that the same Night, or early the next Morning, it is supposed the same Person, having left behind them, upon the Road near Mr. Watson's House, a Bag with large Shot in it, did afterwards shoot into the Dwelling-House of Mr. John Turnard, of Frampton in the said County, with Guns loaded with Pebbles, by which the Windows of two distinct Rooms were broken; for the Apprehension and
