Vienna, July 29. The Emperor arrived at Schonbrunn this Morning about Nine o'Clock in perfect Health.

St. James's, August 15, 1769.

It having been humbly represented to the King, that on the Night of Thursday the 27th of July last, betwixt the Hours of Eleven and Twelve, the Hon. James Drummond was attacked in the Street of the Exchange of Edinburgh, near the Foot of Niddry's Wynd, by Three or Four Persons, who came up behind him, and Two of them having seized him by the Arms, a Third demanded his Money, and attempted to pull out his Watch; that, upon Mr. Drummond's making Resistance, the same Person stabbed him in the Breast with a Penknife, or some other small sharp Instrument, six or Seven different Times, by which the said Knife or Instrument was broke, and Part thereof was afterwards extracted from his Wounds; but Mr. Drummond having disengaged his Arms from the Two Persons who held him, made several Strokes at the Assailants with a Stick that he had in his Hand, and at last got out of them altogether without being robbed; that Mr. Drummond had a smart Fever upon him for some Time, but by having his Wounds immediately washed, and proper Care taken about him, he is now out of Danger: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons in the said Attack, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Favour to any one or more of them, who shall discover him or their Accomplices, (except the Person who did actually stab Mr. Drummond) so that they, or any of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
