GOD Save the KING.

Stockholm, August 2. The King and Queen have been all this last Week at Swartfio, but they will return to Dronningholm on Saturday next.

The Prince and Princess Royal are at Carlberg, from whence they came last Night to the Comedy, and returned as soon as it was over.

Colonel Nordencreutz is appointed Commandant of the Fortrefs of Sweaborg, and Lieutenant-Colonel Sprengport of Louisa, both which lie upon the Frontier of Finland towards Russia.

Count Tockeboldt, the President of the Chancery, has obtained Leave of Absence for six Weeks, and is set out for his Estate in Westrogothia. During his Absence the Foreign Ministers have their usual Conferences every Wednesday with Baron Ulric Scheffer, the Vice-President.

Last Saturday a great Fire broke out in the Northern Suburb of this City, by which, the Wind being very high, Sixteen Houses were consumed in about four Hours.

Copenhagen, August 5. His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester landed safely at Rostock the 1st Instant, and set out the same Day for Hanover.

Florence, August 5. The Great Duke and Dutchess will go to Pisa next Thursday, to see the Illumination of the Cathedral Church, which is performed every Year, and will stay there five Days.

On the 28th past, Marquis Malaspina, Chamberlain to the Great Duke and Dutchess, set out for Parma to compliment, on their Part, the Archdutchess Amelia on her Arrival at Colorno, and both their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Dutchess of Parma on their Nuptials. The said Gentleman

carried a handsome Present from the Great Dutchess to the Dutchess of Parma, consisting of two Sleeve Knots of Diamonds.

On the 29th, Cardinal de la Cerda took his Leave of the Pope, on his Return to Spain. M. Aspuru, the Spanish Minister, presented to him a Cross of Silver Filograna, of particular Workmanship, containing a Piece of Wood of the Holy Cross, and to his Spanish Retinue several Relicks of divers Saints. The Cardinal, who is Patriarch of the Spanish Indies; (having particular Orders from his Catholick Majesty to pass through Florence) arrived here the Day before Yesterday from Rome. He is the first Cardinal who has stopt at Florence since the Establishment of the Court here, as their Pretensions of being received with particular Distinction have never been admitted: He had a separate Audience of their Royal Highnesses on Thursday Evening, without the least Distinction; he kissed the Archdutchess's Hand as Infanta of Spain, but only made a Motion to pull off his red Calote: After his Audience, he followed the Great Duke and Dutchess, with all their Attendants, from their Apartment to the Drawing-Room, where he passed the Evening with many of the Nobility of both Sexes, the Foreign Ministers, and the Strangers who had been presented.

Hamburg, August 8. Last Saturday about Noon arrived here his Serene Highness the Reigning Duke of Mecklenbourg Strelitz, under the Name of Count of Stargard, who proposes, after a Stay of eight or ten Days in this City, to return to his Residence.

It having been humbly represented to the King, That on the Night of Thursday the 27th of July last, betwixt the Hours of Eleven and Twelve, the Hon. James Drummond was attacked in the Street of the Cowgate of Edinburgh, near the Foot of Niddry's Wynd, by Three or Four Persons, who came up behind him, and Two of them having seized him by the Arms, a Third demanded his Money, and attempted to pull out his Watch; that, upon Mr. Drummond's making Resistance, the same Person stabbed him in the Breast with a Penknife, or some other small sharp Instrument,

Six or Seven different Times, by which the said Knife or Instrument was broke, and Part thereof was afterwards extracted from his Wounds; but Mr. Drummond having disengaged his Arms from the Two Persons that held him, made several Strokes at the Assailants with a Stick that he had in his Hand, and at last got free of them altogether without being robbed; that Mr. Drummond had a smart Fever upon him for some Time, but by having his Wounds immediately dressed, and proper Care taken about him, he is now out of Danger: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Assault, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one or more of them, who shall discover his or their Accomplices, (except the Person who did actually stab Mr Drummond) so that they, or any of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
