St. Peterbourg, August 15.

LORD and Lady Effingham and Mr. Howard were presented on Sunday to the Emperess, and received with particular Distinction.

Rome, August 19. The Pope has confirmed the Nomination of the Emperess Queen to the Bishoprick of Ruremonie in the Austrian Flanders, in the Person of a Jesuit Rector of the Theresian College in Vienna.

On the 10th Instant, in the Evening, Cardinal de Solis, Archbishop of Seville, conformable to the Custom of the Cardinals who receive the Hat in Rome, made a most magnificent and expensive Façade to his House, which was illuminated; and various Bands of Musick were disposed in the Balconies, as well as in many Parts within the House, in which the whole Nobility was received. It is said to be the most expensive Decoration of the kind that has been made there.

The Pope, pursuant to the Custom of his Predecessors on their Election, has determined to grant a Jubilee in all Catholick Churches in Christendom, which is to take Place on Sunday the 17th of September.

On the 13th, being the Anniversary of the Birth of the Queen of Naples, Cardinal Orsini was complimented by the Gentlemen of the Cardinals, by the Foreign Ministers, and the Nobility, who are either Subjects, or hold Fiefs of the Two Sicilies.

Stockholm, August 22. The Duke de la Rochefoucault, who has been here some Time, was last Week admitted a Member of the Swedish Academy of Sciences.

Stockholm, August 25. Their Swedish Majesties and the Royal Family came to Town this Week for two Days, and returned to Dronningholm last Wednesday Evening, after the Comedy was ended.

Baron Duben, the Swedish Minister at Warfaw, is recalled.

Lisbon, August 25. On the 19th Instant His Britannick Majesty's Ship the Montreal, Phillips Colby, Esq; Commander, arrived here from Lisbon, and this Day sailed for Mahon.

Florence, August 26. On the 16th Instant the Great Duke and Dutchess returned to this Capital from Pisa, where, on the 14th in the Evening, they accepted of a Ball, which General Schuoulow gave them at the Baths.

On the 18th their Royal Highnesses assisted at the Funeral Obsequies of the late Emperor, which are every Year performed in the Chapel of the Palace; and on the 22d the Great Duke, attended only by Count Thurn, made an Excursion to Pistoia, to view the new Road, which leads from that Province into

the State of the Duke of Modena; from whence he returned to this Place on the 23d in the Evening.

Yesterday the Great Dutchess's Name-day was celebrated here with great Solemnity. There was Gala, and a general Baciamano; after which their Royal Highnesses dined in Publick, and in the Evening there was a great Drawing Room at Court.

St. James's, September 12, 1769.
