The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to Order, that the Parliament, which stands Prorogued to Wednesday the Twentieth of this Instant September, should be further Prorogued to Tuesday the Fourteenth Day of November next.

Moskies, August 27. M. Arceboe, the King of Denmark's Consul at Algiers, is arrived here, the Day having declared War against Denmark, and granted on'y Forty Days of Truce from the 14th Instant, and allowed M. Arceboe only Three Days to withdraw himself and all his Effects from Algiers.

Colen's, September 1. Every Day since the Eector of Mentz's Arrival, the Amusements have been varied. Tuesday there was a Table of 100 Covers; an Apartment at Court, and afterwards a Supper. Wednesday a great Dinner; at Seven in the Evening the Court set out for Schonbrunnst; the Palace and the Long Walk in the Wood were finely illuminated; the Supper was of Five Tables, and the Electors returned Home at One in the Morning. Thursday, after Dining at Court, the Ladies and Gentlemen set out for Karlisch, where an Opera and an elegant Supper were prepared for them. To-day the Elector will hunt on the Plain near Schonbrunnst, and sup at Engers, two Leagues from hence.

Whitehall, September 8, 1769.
