Rome, August 26.

ON the 18th Instant Marquis Antici had an Audience of the Pope, in which he presented his Credentials as Minister from the Elector Palatine to this Court. On the 21st the Pope held a Consistory, in which he conferred several Bishopricks and other Ecclesiastical Benefices in France, Spain, Poland, &c. and promoted a Franciscan Fryar of his own Order to the Bishoprick of Lipari in Sicily. The French King, in Consideration of the Protectorship of the French Nation, sustained by Cardinal Orfini upwards of Four Years, has sent a Gold Snuff-Box, set with Brilliants, to be presented to him by Cardinal Bernis; but as it was bruised in the Carriage, the Cardinal has sent it back to Paris to be repaired, and then delivered to Cardinal Orfini.

Naples, August 29. Her Sicilian Majesty has been indisposed for some Days, and, though much better, is still confined to her Room.

Florence, September 2. On the 28th past a Courier passed by from Rome, for Lisbon, with Dispatches from the Portuguese Minister to his Court.

The Count and Countess Harrache are arrived here from Vienna, on their Tour through Italy: They were graciously received by their Royal Highnesses, and often invited to Dinner at Court; and on the 1st Instant set out for Rome.

On the 9th Instant the Great Duke and Dutchess propose to go to a Place called Poggio a Caiano, an Hunting-Seat about Ten Miles Distance, where they will stay a Month; from thence they will remove to the Ambrogiana, to remain there till the Time of repairing as usual to pass the Winter at Pisa.

Copenhagen, September 9. Monday last being the Anniversary of the Birth-Day of the Queen Juliana Maria, it was observed as a Day of Gala; but there was no Ball, nor any particular Entertainment at Court: His Royal Highness Prince Frederick appeared there for the first Time since his Inoculation.

Berlin, September 9. The King of Prussia, having finished the Reviews of his Troops in Silesia, returned on the 6th to Potsdam in perfect Health.
