Rome, September 9.

MONSIEUR de la Puebla, Archbishop of Mantua, having resigned that Dignity on Account of his ill State of Health, the Pope, by Nomination of the Empress-Queen, has appointed M. Perren, Auditor di Rota for the German Nation in this City, to succeed to it.

A written Paper is handed about here, prohibiting all the Imperial Post-Offices from inserting in their Gazettes any Articles injurious to the Society of the Jesuits.

Last Week Cardinal Alexander Albani had an Audience of the Pope, to demand a Dispensation for the Marriage of the Archduchess Mary Antonia with the Dauphin of France, which was immediately granted.

The Pope has conferred on M. Olivazzi, Dean of the Rota, the vacant Bishoprick of Pavia; and, by the Nomination of the King of Sardinia, has conferred the three Bishopricks of Vercelli, Inurca, and Alba, upon the Abbés Costa, Pochettino, and Vignone, who are arrived here from Piedmont for the Purpose.

The Pope, previous to the Jubilee on his Exaltation (which is to begin on the 17th Instant) has ordered the Missions, and expressly dictated the different Churches and Clergy to perform them; on which Occasion he has excluded the Jesuits.

St. Idesense, September 14. The Princess of Asturias has not dined in Publick since the Accident of her Miscarriage. She was Yesterday with the King and Queen for the first Time; and in a Day or two will, it is believed, receive the Foreign Ministers as usual.

Lisbon, September 15. On the 1st Instant arrived here His Britannick Majesty's Ship *Æolus*, William Bennet, Esq; Commander, and sailed again this Day for Gibraltar.

Florence, September 16. On the 9th Instant, in the Afternoon, the Great Duke and Dutches, attended by a small Retinue, and a Party of Ladies and Gentlemen, (amongst whom was the Earl Cooper) set out for Poggio a Caiano, a Hunting-seat. His Royal Highness proposes to come to Town every Tuesday and Saturday, to assist at the Councils of State and Finances, and to give Publick Audiences, as usual.

The Marquis Malaspina, one of the Great Duke's Chamberlains, who was sent to compliment the Duke and Dutches of Parma on their Marriage, and was charged with a Present to the latter from the Great Dutches, is returned from thence, having received from that Princess a Gold Snuff-box, with her Picture on the Lid set with Diamonds.

Carlton-House, October 1.

This Day the Count de Viry, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sardinia, had his Audience of Leave of her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales.

And afterwards the Count de Scarnafis, his Successor in the same Character, had a Private Audience of her Royal Highness.

To which they were introduced by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

Dublin, September 23.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of Their Majesties Coronation, in the Morning the Flag was hoisted on Birmingham Tower: At Noon his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction; the Great Guns at the Salute Battery in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks: In the Evening a Play was given by his Excellency for the Entertainment of the Ladies; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.
