Florence, September 23. HE Court continue in perfect Health at Poggio a Caiano, where they take the Diversion of Hunting, and in the Evening are at the Comedies, which are performed three Times in the Week. Though the Great Dutchess's Pregnancy has not yet been declared at Court, she is in her third Month.

On the 18th, Cardinal de Solis, attended by a numerous Retinue, arrived here from Rome: He was met, at a small Distance from the Town, by Marquis Viviani, the Spanish Envoy, who conducted him to his House. On the 19th, though the Great Duke was in Town, his Eminence went to the Palace in the Country, to pay his Respects to the Great Dutchess; dined there; and in the Evening had an Audience there of the Great Duke. the 20th the Cardinal went to view the Gallery, and other Curiofities of the City; and early on the zist set out for Bologna, on his Return to Spain. Paris, October 4. His most Christian Majesty and the Royal Family settle at Fontainbleau this Day.
