P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty  
in His Privy Council.

**W**HEREAS Thomas Gilbert, of Marchington in the County of Stafford, Labourer, was, upon the Twenty-fifth Day of October last, charged by Information of a credible Person upon Oath, by him subscribed before John Taylor, Doctor of Laws, and Brooke Boothby, Esquire, two of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace in and for the County of Derby, with having been guilty, upon Sunday the Twentieth Day of August last past, about One or Two of the Clock in the Morning, of Entering the inclosed Park of the Right Honourable George Lord Vernon, at Sudbury in the County of Derby, wherein Deer then were, and long before had been kept; and then, in the said inclosed Park, unlawfully and wilfully killing, with a Greyhound, two Male Fallow Deer, and carrying away and disposing of the same. Which Information was afterwards certified by the said John Taylor and Brooke Boothby, under their Hands and Seals, to one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who has laid the same before His Majesty in His Privy Council, pursuant to the Act of Parliament of the Ninth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the First, in that Case made and provided — His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, Require and Command, That the said Thomas Gilbert do and shall surrender himself within the Space of Forty Days to one of His Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, or to one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, to the End that he may be forth coming to answer the Offence wherewith he stands charged, by the said Information, according to due Course of Law — And His Majesty is pleased further to Order, as it is hereby Ordered, that this Order shall be Printed and Published in the next London Gazette, and shall be forthwith transmitted to the Sheriff of the said County of Derby, and that the said Sheriff shall, within Six Days after the Receipt thereof, by himself or his Officers, Proclaim the same Order, between the Hours of Ten in the Morning and Two in the Afternoon, in the Market-Places, upon the respective Market Days, of two Market Towns, in the said County of Derby, near to the Place where the said Offence was committed, and shall cause a true Copy of this Order to be affixed upon some Public Place in each of such Market Towns, according to the true Intent and Meaning of the said Act of Parliament in that Case made and provided.

*Constantinople, October 18.* A Promotion of Pachas has taken Place here lately. Halil Beg, who was made Buyuch Imrohoh the other Day, is made Beglerbeg of Romelia, and the late Yofferdat is likewise made Pachna of Three Tails, but has no Basilich yet assigned him.  
On Saturday the 14th Instant, a Fire broke out at Beseik Tasci, a Village in the Neighbourhood of Bera, which burned with great Violence from Twelve

o'Clock at Night till Eight o'Clock the next Morning, and consumed near a Thousand Houses.

*Rome, November 4.* In consequence of the Pope's coming from Castle Gandolfo, the Cardinals, the Foreign Ministers, and the Nobility, are also returning from their Country-Seats to this City.

M. Archinto, the late Nuncio at the Court of Tuscany, has been presented by the Great Duke with his Portrait, set with Diamonds of great Value.

An Apartment is preparing, at the Palace of Tuscany in this City, for M. Van Swieten, jun. who is to reside at this Court as Minister from that of Vienna.

*Florence, November 11.* On the 3d Instant Count Rosenbergh returned hither from Germany, and immediately proceeded on his Journey to Pisa.

On the 8th the Great Duke, attended by Count Rosenbergh and Count Gois, arrived here from Pisa, and immediately his Royal Highness sent for the Minister of the Criminal Court, and gave Orders, that all the Criminals, who had taken Refuge in the Churches, should be taken from thence by Force, and conducted to the Prisons, it having been determined, with the Consent of the Court of Rome, that henceforward none but unfortunate Civil Debtors shall be permitted to take Refuge in Churches, not even fraudulent Debtors or Bankrupts.

*Turin, November 18.* The King was taken with a fainting Fit last Wednesday at Supper; but soon recovered, and speaks of it as if nothing had happened. His Majesty was confined to the House on Thursday, and was not at Mass Yesterday; but was in the Drawing room in the Evening, and appeared very lively and well. The Circle in the Drawing-room was very brilliant, it being the Birth-day of her Royal Highness the Dutchess of Savoy.

*Whitehall, December 5.*

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Samuel Mead, Edward Hooper, Henry Pelham, John Frederick, Henry Bankes, Esqrs. Sir William Musgrave, Bart. Corbyn Morris and James Jeffreys, Esqrs. together with Thomas Boone, Esq; in the room of Sir Joseph Pennington, Bart. deceased, to be Commissioners for Levying and Collecting His Majesty's Duties and Customs in that Part of Great-Britain called England, the Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed.
