Westminster, January 23.

HIS Majesty being come to the House of Peers, and seated on the Throne in His Royal Robes with the usual Solemnities, commanded Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, to let the Commons know, It is His Majesty's Pleasure they attend Him immediately. Who being come, Sir Fletcher Norton was presented as their Speaker to His Majesty, who was graciously pleased to approve their Choice.

Westminster, January 22.

The Lord Mansfield, who had, by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, been appointed to supply the Place of Lord Chancellor or Lord Keeper in the House of Peers, took his Place this Day accordingly.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty, having constituted Sir Sidney Stafford Smythe, Knight, one of the Barons of His Majesty's Court of Exchequer, the Honorable Henry Bathurst, Esquire, one of the Justices of His Majesty's Court of Common Pleas, and Sir Richard Aston, Knight, one of the Justices of His Majesty's Court of King's Bench, Lords Commissioners for the Custody of the Great Seal, was this Day pleased in Council to deliver to them the Great Seal of Great-Britain; and the said Lords Commissioners did thereupon take the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy, and also the Oath as Lords Commissioners for the Custody of the Great Seal.

War-Office, January 23, 1770.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the King, that there are, at this Time, several Deserters from the different Corps in His Majesty's Land Service; that, by an Offer of His Majesty's gracious Pardon, they might be induced to return to their Duty; and that such an Instance of His Royal Clemency might have a due Influence upon their future Behaviour; His Majesty is graciously pleased to grant His free Pardon to all Deserters from His Land Forces, under the following Limitations and Conditions:

1st. That such of the said Deserters as are now in Great-Britain or Ireland, or in the Garrison of Gibraltar or Island of Minorca, do surrender themselves, on or before the 30th of June 1770, either to the Regiments to which they belonged, or to any others on those Stations, or to any Recruiting Party of Our Forces; the Deserters from the Cavalry to surrender to some Corps of the Cavalry, and De-

serters from the Infantry to some Corps of the Infantry.

2dly. That such Deserters as are now in North America, the West Indies, or Africa, do surrender themselves, on or before the 31st Day of December 1770, to their respective Regiments, or to any others which may be stationed at the Places where such Deserters happen to be.

3dly. That they shall be entitled to the Benefit of this Pardon upon their declaring from what Corps they deserted, and consenting to enlist in the Corps to which they shall have surrendered.

4thly. And whereas it hath been represented to the King, that many of the said Deserters may have since enlisted into other Corps, and may be now serving therein; His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to such Deserters the Benefit of this Pardon, and to permit them to continue to serve in such Corps, upon their confessing their Desertion to the Commanding Officer.

5thly. And whereas it is probable, that many of the said Deserters, either from Age or Infirmities, may not now be fit to be received again into the Service; it is His Majesty's Pleasure, that, upon such Deserters applying to the Commanding Officer of any Corps of the Land Forces, and confessing their Desertion, a Certificate shall be granted to them, under the Regimental Seal, and signed by the Commanding Officer, of their having surrendered themselves agreeable to His Majesty's Pleasure herein signified; which Certificate shall entitle them to the full Benefit of this Pardon.

6thly. And whereas several of the said Deserters have been apprehended, and are now in Goal, or in Military Custody; His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to them His Free Pardon, of which they are to have the full Benefit upon their Arrival at their respective Regiments, or upon their being permitted to enlist in any other Corps of His Majesty's Land Forces.

Vienna, January 6. Last Sunday Count Ulfeldt, Grand Maitre of the Court, was struck with an Apoplexy at Table, and died a few Hours afterwards. Her Imperial Majesty, to testify her Approbation of his long and faithful Services, ordered, that all possible Honour and Respect should be shewn to his Memory. He was accordingly buried at her Expence with the greatest Pomp last Wednesday. No Officer of State has been buried with such extraordinary Marks of Distinction since Prince Eugene.
