Lifton, March 1. Their most Faithful Majesties are expected to return from Salvaterra to the Palace of Ajuda on the 3d Inflant.

On the 25th alt. the Count de Mazin, Minister Plenipotentiary from his Sardinian Majesty at this Court, arrived here from Madrid.
