The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS there was this Day read at the Board, a Letter from Keith Urquhart, Sheriff Depute of the County of Banff in Scotland, to the Lord Juftice Clerk, and a Copy of a Letter from Theophilus Ogilvie, Collector of the Customs at Aberdeen, to the Commissioners of the Customs in Scotland, containing Information, that an infectious Diffemper had broke out amongst the Horned Cattle in and about the Town of Portfoy in the faid County of Banff; -That the Sheriff Depute, and several of the Justices of the Peace of the faid County, did, upon hearing thereof, meet together, to confider what was fit to be done; That, upon Enquiry, finding that the Infection was fpreading, and that Cattle belonging to feveral different Persons, had died of the Distemper, they came to the Refolution of ordering all the Cattle in and about the Town of Portsoy to be appretiated, and to order them to be killed and buried, after giving Affurance to the Owners of an Indemnification for the Lofs of their Cattle; and that their Orders had been accordingly carried into Execution, by killing and burying the Number of One Hun-dred and Forty-two Cattle;—That the faid Sheriff Depute and Justices of the Peace, did hire proper Persons to watch and prevent all Cattle from being brought into the Town, and did give the necessary Directions to cleanse the Cow-houses, and other Places where the infected Cattle had been ;there was Reason to believe the Insection had been brought from Holland in the Packages of uncuftomed or prohibited Goods, which had been imug-gled into that Part of the Kingdom.—And whereas by an Act passed in this present Year of His Majesty's Reign, intitled, "An Act for indemnifying all Per-" fons with respect to Advising or Carrying into Exe-" cution His Majelly's Orders of Council made for preventing the Spreading of a contagious Diffemper amongst the Horned Cattle, and for rendring the " fame valid and effectual, and for preventing Suits " in confequence thereof, and to authorize the con-"tinuing, extending, and executing the same for a further Time;" - His Majesty is empowered, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to extend His Orders iffued upon the feventh and four-teenth Days of December last, for preventing the Spreading of the said infectious Distemper in the County of Southampton, to all such Count es and Places in Great British as His Majesty, in His great Places in Great-Britain, as His Majesty, in His great Wifdom, shall judge most expedient and effectual to prevent the Spreading of fuch infectious Distemper;

-His Majesty, taking the said Letters into Consideration, and approving the Steps already taken, is graciously pleased to confirm the Assurance given to the Owners of the Cattle which have been killed,

of the utmost Importance that such further Steps thould be taken, as may appear to be necessary to prevent the Spreading of the faid infectious Distemper, that has already broke out, or may hereafter break out, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, is pleafed, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the Sheriff Depute, or Substitute in the County of Banff, do call a Meeting of the Justices of the Peace of the said County of Banff, to be held in the Town of Portfoy, or at any convenient Place near thereto; and that the faid Sheriff Depute, or Sub-flitute, and Justices of the Peace so assembled, the Number of Justices not being less than three, do afcertain the value of the Cattle already killed, from the Appretiations made of them, or in any other Wanner that to them may appear the most proper, for discovering the just Value thereof, and of the Expence unavoidably incurred in preventing the Spreading of the Distemper; and that they do make up an Account thereof, and certify the fame by a Writing under their Hands, the Sheriff Depute or Substitute being always one who shall subscribe the said Writing .- And it is further ordered, that the faid Sheriff Depute or Subflitute, and any three or more of the faid Justices of Peace of the faid County of Bansk, or the Sheriff Depute or Substitute, and any three or more of the Justices of Peace of any other County in Scotland, within which the faid Infectious Diffemper shail appear, may meet together and order such Steps to be taken, as to them shail feem the most likely to stop and prevent the Spreading of the faid Dittemper, where it is now broke out, or where it may hereafter break out, by the due Execution of the following Directions; particularly if they judge it necessary to buy up all Oxen, Bulls, Cows, Calves, Steers, and Heiters, whether infected or not, in those Places within which, in their Judgment, the Infection shall have broke out or spread to, at a Price not exceeding their fair and full Value, to be afcertained by the Report of two or more Persons, whom they shall appoint to appretiate the said Cattle upon Oath; and to give Orders, that the Cattle, to beight and appretiated, shall be im-mediately killed, and their Carcasses and Hides buried and treated in all Respects in the Manner prescribed by an Order of His late Majesty in Council, dated the 22d of March 1747. And in Case there should be any Owner or Owners of Cattle, so regardless of the Publick Welfare, as to refuse to fell such their Cattle at the Prices which they shall be appreciated at, that the faid Sheriff Depute or Sheriff Substitute, and any three or more Justices of the Peace of the County, may cause such Cattle to be nevertheless killed and treated as aforefaid-But His Majesty is pleased to declare, That it is not intended that the Powers contained in the faid Order of the 22d of March 1747, should be revived by this present Order, other than those which regard the Treating

Treating of the Cattle when killed, and the Preventing the Driving or Removing any Horned Cattle, that shall be within the Compass of one Mile of any Infected Place, unless from one Pasture to another, or to Water, or for the Purpose of Slaughter-ing such Cattle; and that such Cattle be not, on any Pretence whatfoever, permitted to be removed farther than one Mile from fuch Infected Place-And it is further ordered, That the Sheriff Deputes or Substitutes, and Justices, who may meet for the Purpose of Executing these His Majesty's Orders, shall at such Meetings from Time to Time, make up a diffinct Account of the Cattle voluntarily fold by the Owners, and of the Cattle that shall be killed without the Owners Confent, from the Appretiations to be made of them in the Manner be-fore directed, and of all such unavoidable Expence incurred in Executing their Directions for preventing the Spreading of the faid Diftemper; and after certifying the Amount thereof by a Writing under their Hands, the Sheriff Depute or Substitute being always one who certifies the same, shall transmit the said Accounts, Certificates, and Appretiations, to the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treaform and shall communicate from Time to Time to fary, and shall communicate from Time to Time to this Board, what they shall have done in Obedience to this Order—And His Majesty, with the like Advice of His Privy Council, hereby orders the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to iffue fuch Sums from Time to Time as may be necessary to pay all Charges and Expences occasioned by the Execution of this Order, and that shall be certified to them in Manner before directed.

Rome, March 17. The Pope has induced the Senate of Venice to admit M. del Bono as his Conful

Cardinal Bernis, in an Audience of the Pope, no-tified to him, on the Part of the King his Master, that he had immediately caused the Indulto for the Jubilee to be remitted to the Bishops of the Kingdom, in order to be published in their respective Dioceses.

The Pope, on Notice that the King of Pruffia had condescended to permit the Archbishop of Prague to visit the Churches in the County of Glatz, has directed the Abbé Ciofani, his Pruffian Majesty's Agent, to convey to him his Acknowledgments for this Act of Condescension.

On the 12th Inftant the Pope held a Confiftory, in which he filled up feveral vacant Archbishopricks in France, Italy, and Spain; amongst which was that of Valencia, to M. Aspuru, the Spanish Minister at this Court; for which the Pope, out of a personal Regard for M. Aspuru, has granted a Dispensation for the Payment of about 1200 Crowns, the Fees due to the Datary, on his Promotion to that Benefice ..

Florence, March 24. In the last Week two Barbary Horses were sent to Madrid by the Great Dutchess, as a Present to the Prince of Asturias, her Brother, for the Introduction of Horse Races in Spain.

On the 13th at Noon the Great Duke, attended by the Counts Rosemberg and Thurn, returned here from the Excursion he had made to visit the Eastward Sea-Coast called the Maremme of Pifa, and likewise the Cecinæ Campiglia and its Terriere, those of Massa, the Alom Rocks of Monte Rotondo, Groffeto, and its adjacent Sea-Coaft.

The 19th, being the Emperor's Name-Day, there was a Gala at Court; on which Occasion the Foreign Ministers, the Nobility, and Military Officers complimented the Great Duke.

On the 20th Instant the Great Duke caused an Edict to be published, notifying to the Publick the Reduction from 3 1/2 to 3 per Cent. on the Publick Stocks called Luoghi di Monte, which is to take Place the 1st of April, offering to those that should decline to fubmit to that Reduction the Payment of their capital Sums by certain Portions at a Time.

Stockholm, March 27. Baron Bengt Sparre is set out this Day for Dresden, in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from this Court to the Elector of Saxony.

Prince Charles's Journey to Aix la Chapelle has been prevented, by the violent Cold, from taking Place at the Time fixed, and is put off till the Weather is milder.
