## A RESOLUTION and ORDER of the HOUSE of COMMONS.

*Jovis, 26<sup>o</sup> Die Aprilis, 1770.*

*Resolved.*

**T**HAT the Sum of One Million Five Hundred Thousand Pounds Capital Stock of Annuities, after the Rate of Three Pounds Ten Shillings per Centum, established by an Act, made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act for granting to His Majesty the Sum of Two Millions, to be raised by Way of Annuities and a Lottery, and charged on the Sinking Fund, redeemable by Parliament, and for extending to Ireland the Laws made in this Kingdom against Private and unlawful Lotteries, be redeemed and paid off on the Twelfth Day of February next, after discharging the Interest then payable in Respect of the same.

*Ordered.*

That Mr. Speaker do forthwith give Notice, that the Sum of One Million Five Hundred Thousand Pounds Capital Stock of Annuities, after the Rate of Three Pounds Ten Shillings per Centum, established by an Act made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act for granting to His Majesty the Sum of Two Millions, to be raised by Way of Annuities and a Lottery, and charged on the Sinking Fund, redeemable by Parliament, and for extending to Ireland the Laws made in this Kingdom against Private and unlawful Lotteries, will be redeemed and paid off on the Twelfth Day of February next, after discharging the Interest then payable in Respect of the same, agreeable to the Clauses and Powers of Redemption contained in the said Act.

Which Resolution and Order, thus signified and published by me, are to be sufficient Notice of the Re-payment of One Million Five Hundred Thousand Pounds, for which the said Annuities were established, and of the Redemption of the Annuities as are attending the same.

I could not with Safety do it any other way as I would certainly have been discovered & my life in danger as well as yours for its resolved & sworn as above to stand true to one another &c: & if you cannot be caught out of door at night its resolved upon to take a shorter method. my hand trembles while I write. wishing That
