A PROCLAMATION.

TOWNSHEND.

WHEREAS His Majesty hath signified unto Us His Royal Pleasure, That the Parliament of this Kingdom, which now stands Prorogued to Tuesday the First Day of May next, be further Prorogued to Tuesday the Twenty eighth Day of August following; We do therefore Publish and Declare, that the said Parliament be, and accordingly the said Parliament is, hereby, further Prorogued to Tuesday the Twenty eighth Day of August next: Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons, in this present Parliament, are to take Notice accordingly. Given at His Majesty's Castle of Dublin the 20th Day of April, 1770.

GOD Save the KING.

Stockholm, April 10. Last Thursday their Swedish Majesties went out of Town to Ulricksdahl, where they will remain till after the Holidays.

I could not with Safety do it any other way as I would certainly have been discovered & my life in danger as well as yours for its resolved & sworn as above to stand true to one another &c: & if you cannot be caught out of door at night its resolved upon to take a shorter method. my hand trembles while I write. wishing That God may give you Grace to take warning &

in Time of This desperate affair so Joins yours unknown.
