Twenty five Gallies Commanded by the Sieurs de la Broff furdier and Demanfe Commanders of Squadrons,

The Fleet having passed the Fare, and dou! led the Careroi Melazer, Orlando, Cefaledo, and Zaspano, arrived the 37 of May within sight of Paterno, and the next day, the Enemies appeared without the Mole. The Doke de-Viniane, that he might be well informed of the possure of the Enemies, sent out the Sieur de Gabatett, the Chevalice de Fourville, the Marquis de Langeron, and the Chevalter de Chaumont, who putting them-felves into a Felucca, under protection of the Gallies, approachfelves into a Felucca, under protection of the Gallies, approached within half Cannon shot of the Enemies Fleet; and being returned, gave an account, That the Spanish and Dutch Fleet, composed of 47 Men of War, 19 Gallies, and 4 Fireships, lay in a Line, having the Mole on their left, the Fort of Castlemare behind the insiddle of their Line, and the great Tower and the Baltions of the Town on their right: Upon which, a Council of War was held; and it was resolved to attack the Van of the Enemy, with nine Men of Wars seven Gallies, and five Fireships, while the rest of our Fleet fell upon their main Body, and their Rear. The Marquis de Pecculty is made choice of to and their Rear. The Marquis de Premity is made choice of to command this detachement, and accordingly, on the second of fune, he put himself with the Ships commanded by the Marquis d' Anfieville, the Marquis de Langueren, the Cheva-valiers de Hailly, de Lbery, de la Motte, de Goetlogou, the Sicurs de Beaulieu, and de Coatesuneuf, with five Firelipps, and feven Gallies, at the head of our Fleet, and being favoured with a Windat N. E. approached the Enemies Van within a Cables length, and coming there to an anchor, prepared to fend on the Fireships upon them. The Enemies in the mean time, fire very fariously; but not being able to bear our shot, sear-ing our sireships, astonish at the boldness of our Men, and vanily trusting to the Forts and Baltions of Falcron, as length cut their Cables, and some endeavoured to save themselves by running ashore. In this disorder, three Fireships of the detachement boarded three Men of War, and burnt them; and at the same time, our Fleet sell upon the Enemies Rear and main Body, where were the Admirals of Spain and Holland; the Cannon played furiously on both sides, and the Fight was for some time very obstinate; but the Duke de Vinstne making use of the advantage of the Wind, and the terror the Enemies were in, pressed upon them, and put them into great disorder; whereupon two of our Fireships boarded the Admiral of Spain, and burnt him; the Vice-Admiral of Spain and the Rear-Admiral of Holland in the mean time out their Cables; and the rest solitoned their example, some run on shore, and the rest got into the Port, while the Captains of the sour Dutch Fireships set themselves on fire, to prevent their falling into our hands. Seven of the Enemies Men of War run assort together, and four of our Fireships set fire to them, and they were all burnt in a short time, the wind that blew pretty stiff very much contributing thereunto. The burning the Admiral and Vice-Admiral of Spain, and Rear-Admiral of Holland, with nine other Capital Men of War, and sour Fireships, and the siring by that means so many Batrels of Powder, which the Cannon played furiously on both fides, and the Fight was with nine other Capital Men or war, and four Firenins, and the firing by that means so many Barrels of Powder, which blew up into the air, pieces of Iron, of Cannon, and whole parts of Ships, either sunk or burnt the Reals, the Payrone of Naples, and four other Gallies; killed and maimed a great number of Men; did great damage to the Ships that were in the Port, and even tuned several houses in Palerms, and canted among the Enemies unexpressible terror, and consuston; the Slaves which the Enemy had unchained to put out the fire in their Gallies threw themselves into the Sea, and Yaved themtheir Gallies threw themselves into the Sea, and Yaved them-felves on board our ships, and our Gallies took up a great ma-ny Seamen and Soldiers, and afterwards put them on shore. In sum, the Enemy in this action have lest 12 of their best Men of War, 6 Gallies, 5000 Men, and 700 pieces of Can-non On our side the Sieur de Valbelle, and the Chevalier de St Syphorien were wounded, and the Sieurs Gonvalin and Neufville Ensigns, killed.
