*Constantinople, March 17.*  
**O**N the 3d Instant died Osmyn, Musti, in which Office he is succeeded by Mirza-Zade, an old Kerasker.

*Rome, April 7.* The Pope, in Return for the two managed Horses, which the Prince of Stigliano sent to him from Naples, has presented to him a Set of Beads of Jasper, with a Gold Medal, accompanied with many Indulgences, and a Letter in Latin, in Form of a Brief, expressing his Acknowledgments. The Pope has also presented to the Abbé Dionisi, the Prince's Agent, a Gold and Silver Medal, representing the Function of his taking Possession.

The Prince Xavier of Saxony continues to view the Curiosities of this City, and frequents the Assemblies of the Nobility. In the last Week he went to Tivoli, to view the Antiquities there, and the Villa Adriana, where he was entertained at Dinner by Baron St. Odile. On the 4th Instant his Royal Highness was entertained at Dinner by the Venetian Ambassador; and on the 5th by Cardinal Bernis, a second Time.

The Bishops in the Spanish America, according to their Custom to renew every Ten Years certain Briefs of Indulgences, for which they used to pay 7000 Crowns, having petitioned the Pope for the Reduction to 2000, he has readily condescended to it.

A few Days ago the Abbé Telli, Agent of the Prince of Erchopoli, received an Express, with Notice of the Decease of Count Schombron, Grand Provost of the Churches of Eichester and Bamberg; which Event the said Agent communicated the next Day to the Pope, who conferred the vacant Canonship of Eichester upon Baron Gebrattel.

*Rome April 14.* A few Days ago the two Princesses of Modena caused a Request to be made to the Pope by Abbé Saltini, the Duke's Agent at Rome, for Permission to reside, during their Pleasure, in a Convent erected at Modena by a Prince of the House of Este; which Permission the Pope has readily granted.

The Pope has lately purchased the celebrated Greek Statue of Meleager for the Price of 6000 Crowns, which he designs to place in the Gallery of the Capitol.

In the Digging in a Vineyard near Rome, a very fine ancient Statue of Hercules, with a Pedestal, has been found.

The King of Portugal has named three Subjects for the three vacant Bishopricks in his Dominions; but their Names are not to be presented to the Pope till after the Arrival of M. Conti, the Nuncio at Lisbon.

On the 9th Instant Cardinal Alexander Albani entertained Prince Xavier of Saxony at Dinner at his Villa near Porta Solara.

The Pope, attended by the Cardinals, and his whole Retinue, has performed the Ceremonies of the Holy Week with great Solemnity; and, as a Mark of his Disposition to accommodate the Disagreements, which have so long subsisted with many Roman Catholick Courts, he has suspended, for this Year, the solemn Publication of the Bull in Cœna Domini, which used to be performed from the Great Balcony of St. Peter's Church.

*Lisbon, April 7.* This Court will remove on the 17th Instant to Salvaterra, from whence their Ma-

jesties propose to go to a Hunting-Seat at Alenteirim.

*Madrid, April 12.* The Court arrived here from the Pardo on Saturday last the 7th Instant; and this being the Holy Week, his Catholick Majesty, according to Custom, visits Seven Churches, and washes the Feet of Twelve poor Men. Wednesday next the Court goes to Aranjuez, and the King to Cuerva, situated about Ten Leagues from Toledo, where his Majesty takes the Diversion of Shooting a Species of Wild Cat peculiar to that Spot. On the 27th of this Month his Majesty returns to Aranjuez, where it is imagined there will be this Year a great Concourse of People, as well on Account of the Beauty of the Place, as the various Diversions preparing there.

*Madrid, April 19.* The Court left this Place Yesterday, to go to Aranjuez.

*Florence, April 14.* On the 12th Instant the Great Duke came to the City, from the Palace in the Country, to perform the Ceremonies, practised on that Day, of washing the Feet of Twelve old Men, and serving them at Dinner; and in the Afternoon his Royal Highness, attended by his whole Court, his Guards, and many of the Nobility, made a Procession on Foot, to visit the Sepulchres in Seven Churches, as usual. The Great Dutchess, hourly expecting to be brought to Bed, remained in the Country, not being in a Condition to perform any of the Ceremonies of the Day.

*Florence, April 21.* On the 14th Instant, being Easter-day, the Great Duke, attended by his whole Court and Guards, in State, came from the Palace in the Country, to the Cathedral Church, to assist at the Ceremonies of that Day; after which he returned to the Country. His Royal Highness being prevented going to Pisa, as the Great Dutchess's Delivery is daily expected, has appointed Count Alberti, Counsellor of State and Deputy Secretary at War, to hold a Chapter, on the 22d Instant, of the Order of the Knights of St. Stephen, (a Ceremony which is performed every third Year at Pisa) and to represent his Person there on this Occasion.

Notice is this Instant brought from the Great Duke's Palace in the Country, that the Great Dutchess was happily delivered of a Princess between Nine and Ten o'Clock this Morning; her Royal Highness had been walking in the Garden half an Hour before.

*Turin, April 17.* His Sardinian Majesty is perfectly well, and talks of Riding as soon as the Weather will permit.

*Vienna, April 21.* On Monday last the French Ambassador, who had made his publick Entry the Day before, had formal Audiences of their Imperial Majesties, to demand in Marriage the Arch-Dutchess Antonia, who was thereupon immediately betrothed to his Royal Highness the Dauphin; and on Thursday Evening the Ceremony of the Marriage was performed with the usual Solemnities.

Yesterday her Royal Highness received Compliments of the Ambassadors, Foreign Ministers and Principal Nobility; and departed from hence this Morning. The Emperor accompanies her Royal Highness as far as Molk, where she rests To-night; his Imperial Majesty returns hither To-morrow.

*Dresden, April 29.* The whole Electoral Family will remove from hence to their Country Residence at Piltz, the 9th of next Month.
