Westminster, May 19.

**T**HIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

*An Act for establishing a Lottery; and for other Purposes therein mentioned.*

*An Act for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money out of the Sinking Fund, and for applying certain Monies therein mentioned for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and seventy; and for further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament.*

*An Act for redeeming the Capital or Joint Stock of Annuities, after the Rate of Three Pounds Ten Shillings per Centum, established by an Act made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act for granting to His Majesty the Sum of Two Millions, to be raised by Way of Annuities and a Lottery, and charged on the Sinking Fund, redeemable by Parliament, and for extending to Ireland the Laws made in this Kingdom against private and unlawful Lotteries.*

*An Act for repealing the Duties upon Bass, or Straw, Chip, Cane, and Horse Hair Hats and Bonnets, and upon certain Materials for making the same, imported into this Kingdom, and for granting other Duties in Lieu thereof; and for the more effectual preventing the fraudulent Importation of such Goods.*

*An Act for continuing the Bounties on British and Irish Linens exported; for further discontinuing the Duties on the Importation of Foreign Raw Linen Yarns made of Flax, and for granting a Bounty on the Exportation of British Chequed and Striped Linens, and upon British and Irish Diapers, Huckabacks, Sheetings, and other Linen of above a certain Breadth.*

*An Act for appropriating a Fund, established by an Act made in the Seventh Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for granting to His Majesty additional Duties on certain Foreign Linens imported into this Kingdom; and for establishing a Fund for the encouraging of the raising and dressing of Hemp and Flax.*

*An Act for continuing so much of an Act made in the Third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act to continue and amend two Acts, made in the Twenty-fifth and Twenty-eighth Years of his late Majesty's Reign, for encouraging the making of Indigo in the British Plantations in America; and for extending the Provisions of an Act of the Thirtieth Year of his late Majesty's Reign, with respect to bringing Prize Goods into this Kingdom, to Spanish Prize Goods taken since the late Declaration of War with Spain, as relates to encouraging the making of Indigo in the British Plantations in America; and for explaining so much of an Act made in the Fifth Year of His present Majesty's Reign*

*as relates to the regulating the Fees of the Officers of the Customs in America, and for extending the same to the Naval Officers there.*

*An Act to enable the Governor, Council, and Assembly, of His Majesty's Colony of New York, to pass an Act of Assembly, for creating and issuing upon Loan, Paper Bills of Credit to a certain Amount; and to make the same a legal Tender in Payments into the Loan Offices and Treasury of the said Colony.*

*An Act for the further preventing Delays of Justice by reason of Privilege of Parliament.*

*An Act to enable the Speaker of the House of Commons to issue his Warrants to make out new Writs, for the Choice of Members to serve in Parliament, in the Room of such Members as shall die during the Recess of Parliament.*

*An Act to prevent the further Spreading of the contagious Disorder among the Horned Cattle, in Great Britain.*

*An Act to indemnify such Persons, in Great Britain and Ireland, as have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices and Employments within the Time limited by Law, and for allowing further Time for that Purpose; for allowing further Time for registering and inrolling Agreements entered into for inclosing Commons, for the Purpose of planting and preserving Trees for Timber and Underwood; and for indemnifying Persons who have omitted to make and file Affidavits of the Execution of Indentures of Clerks to Attorneys and Solicitors.*

*An Act for registering the Prices at which Corn is sold in the several Counties of Great Britain, and the Quantity exported and imported.*

*An Act for defraying the Expence of Building the New Office of Excise in London, out of His Majesty's Revenue of Excise.*

*An Act for rendering more effectual several Acts, for providing a public Reward for discovering the Longitude at Sea; for improving the Lunar Tables constructed by the late Professor Mayer; and for encouraging Discoveries and Improvements useful to Navigation.*

*An Act for better regulating Persons employed in the Service of the East-India Company; and for other Purposes therein mentioned.*

*An Act for more effectually preventing Traders in Excisable Commodities from using false Weights and Scales; and for explaining and amending several Acts of Parliament relating to Hackney Coaches and Chairs.*

An Act for rectifying a Mistake in an Act, made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for better securing the Duties of Customs upon certain Goods removed from the Out-Ports, and other Places, to London; for regulating the Fees of the Officers of His Majesty's Customs in the Province of Senegambia in Africa; for allowing to the Receivers General of the Duties on Offices and Employments, in Scotland, a proper Compensation for their Trouble and Expences; for the better Preservation of Hollies, Thorns, and Quicksets in Forests, Chaces, and Private Grounds, and of Trees and Underwoods in Forests and Chaces; and for authorizing the Exportation of a limited Quantity of an inferior Sort of Barley, called Bigg, from the Port of Kirkwall in the Islands of Orkney.

An Act to repeal an Act, passed in the Thirty first Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, "An Act for Relief of the Coal-heavers working upon the River Thames; and for enabling them to make Provision for such of themselves as shall be sick, lame, or past their Labour," and for their Widows and Orphans," and to regulate the Price of their Labour, to prevent Frauds and Impositions on such Labourers, and for their further Relief.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,  
THE Season of the Year, and the Dispatch you have given to the Publick Business, make it proper for Me to put an End to this Session of Parliament.

The Temper, with which you have conducted all your Proceedings, has given Me great Satisfaction, and I promise Myself the happiest Effects from the Firmness as well as the Moderation which you have manifested in the very critical Circumstances which have attended your late Deliberations.

With respect to Foreign Affairs, I have nothing material to communicate to you. I will continue My Endeavours to appease, if possible, the Troubles which still prevail in some Parts of Europe, or at least to prevent them from spreading farther. In all Events it shall be My first and constant Care to watch over the Interests, and to preserve undiminished the Rights of My People.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,  
I return you My Thanks for the Supplies you have so cheerfully granted for the Service of the current Year, as well as for your Attention to make Use of every Opportunity of reducing the National Debt. The Provision you have been able to make in this Session for discharging so considerable a Sum, without laying any further Burthen on My Subjects, cannot but be highly advantageous to Publick Credit.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,  
I must earnestly recommend to you to exert, in your respective Counties, the same Zeal and Prudence that you have shewn in Parliament for promoting the Peace and the Welfare of the Kingdom: Nothing can be so favorable to the Wishes of Those, who look with Jealousy on the Strength and Prosperity of this Country, as the Prevalence of Animosities and Dissentions amongst Ourselves: Let it therefore be your Care to discountenance every Attempt to infuse groundless Suspicions and Discon-



tent into the Minds of your Fellow-Subjects : Make Them sensible of My constant Attention to promote Their Happiness; and convince Them, that nothing can so effectually secure Their Liberties, as the Maintenance of every Part of Our Excellent Constitution in its due Force and Authority.

Then the Lord Speaker, by His Majesty's Command, said :

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

*It is His Majesty's Royal Will and Pleasure, That this Parliament be prorogued to Thursday the 19th Day of July next, to be then here held; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Thursday the 19th Day of July next.*

*Aranjuez, April 16* The Duke of Huescar, only Son of the Duke of Alba, died this Evening at Madrid, universally esteemed and regretted.

*Rome, April 28.* Cardinal de Bernis is making great Preparations for the Festivals, which he has received Orders from his Court to make in this City, for the Nuptials of the Dauphin of France with the Archduchess Maria-Antonia of Austria. The Princes Tablowski and other Polish Gentry are on their Departure from hence to Paris on that Occasion.

The French King, agreeably to the Indulto lately obtained from the Pope, has named two Corsicans and a Frenchman to fill up the three vacant Bishopricks in that Island.

A few Days ago M. Aspuru, the Archbishop of Valencia, set out for Palo, for the Benefit of the Sea Air.

The King of Poland has presented Marquis Antici, his Minister at this Court, with a fine Set of Saxon China for a Desert.

The Grand Master of Malta, at the Request of the Pope, has granted Leave to the Lady of Marquis de Bernis, as well as her Husband, to wear the Cross of that Order as Descendants of a former Grand Master.

On the 22d Instant the Venetian Ambassador, having received his Letter of Recall, had a publick Audience of the Pope; but he is to remain here a few Weeks in private till his Successor's Arrival.

On the 23d Prince Xavier of Saxony set out for Naples, where he proposes to observe a strict Incognito, as he has done here.

*Florence, May 5.* This Day, being the Great Duke's Birth-day, his Royal Highness came from the Palace in the Country to that in Town, to receive the Compliments of the Nobility, the Foreign Ministers, and the Military Officers, on that Occasion. In the Evening the Cannons of the Castles are to be fired, and the usual Fire-Works will be played off at the Old Palace; and the Theatre is to be illuminated.

The Great Dutchess is extremely weak; but the young Princess, whose Life was almost despaired of, is now thought to be out of Danger.

Last Week the Prince and Princess Giustiniani passed by this City from Rome, on their Journey to Vienna; and the Prince Rezzonico, Nephew of the late Pope, and Senator of Rome, passed by also from thence for Venice.

*Turin, May 5.* His Sardinian Majesty proposes going to the Veneria as soon as the Weather, which has been remarkably bad, will permit. It is thought it will be about the 12th of this Month, if the Weather changes.
