*The Queen's Palace, St. James's Park,
May 22, 1770.*

THIS Morning, between Eight and Nine o'Clock, the Queen was happily delivered of a Princess. Her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales, his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury, several Lords of His Majesty's most Honorable Privy Council, and the Ladies of Her Majesty's Bed-Chamber, were present.

Her Majesty is, God be praised, as well as can be expected; and the Young Princess is in perfect Health.

This Event was immediately made known by the Firing of the Tower Guns.

Stockholm, May 1. The 28th of last Month, the Anniversary of the King of Sweden's Orders was held here with the usual Ceremony; and his Swedish Majesty made the President of the Tribunal at Wismar, Charles Otto Von Hopken, Commander of the North Star, and several other Knights both of the Sword and the North Star.

Aranjuez, May 3. His Catholick Majesty returned hither from Cuerva on Saturday last the 28th of April; and this Place now begins to fill, most of the People of Fashion being come from Madrid, either to partake of the Diversions, or enjoy the Pleasantry of the Situation

Mr. Wall is arrived here, on his annual Visit, in perfect Health, from his Country-Seat, where he constantly passes the Rest of the Year.

Hamburg, May 11. His Danish Majesty's Squadron, composed of four Ships of the Line, two Frigates, one Transport, two Fire-Ships, and one Brigantine, sailed from Copenhagen for the Mediterranean on the 2d Instant, and passed the Sound the next Day.
