The Queen's Palace, St. James's Park, May 22, 1770.

HIS Morning, between Eight and Nine o'Clock, the Queen was happily delivered of a Princess. Her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales, his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury, several Lords of His Majesty's most Honorable Privy Council, and the Ladies of Her Majesty's Bed-Chamber, were present.

Her Majetty is, God be praised, as well as can be expected; and the Young Princess is in

perfect Health.

Stockbolm, May 1. The 28th of last Month, the Anniversary of the King of Sweden's Orders was held here with the usual Ceremony; and his Swediff Majesty made the Prefident of the Tribunal at Wifmar, Charles Otto Von Hopken, Commander of the North Star, and feveral other Knights both of the Sword and the North Star.

Custom-House, London, May 16, 1770. Whereas a Warrant is iffued for apprehending W1-liam Burton, late a Clerk in the Tide-Surveyors Office in the Custom-House of the Port of London, upon Su-picion of having fallel made, forged, and counterfeired a certain Bill, commonly called a Tidesman's Bill, for Payment of Three Pounds to Francis Gendre, with Intent to cheat and defraud His Majefly of the Same :

The Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, in order to bring the faid William Button to Justice, do bereby promise a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS to any Person or Persons that shall apprehend, or cause him to be according to him to be apprehended, so that he may be brought be-fore any Magistrate of the City of London, to answer the said Offence; to be paid by the Receiver-General of His Majefty's Customs upon Conviction. St. James's, May 8, 1770. Whereas it has been bumbly represented to the King, That on the 22a of February last, in the Morning, the following threatening Letter was found in the Garden of Mrs. Wakon, of Carry Bridge in the County of Lancaster :

" To Ambras wolton at Caribbe Bridg " A Ambras Wolton this to Let you now that if " you do not forthwith and Immedetely Caufe the Body of will. Lonfdel to be fet at Liberty I will " Caufe your Blood to be fled upon the Ground

" and that with out mercy I am your " Humble Sr.v

" Edward Dupont"

And that, on the 23d of February last, the follow-ing Letter was found at the Door of John Bannister, Innholder, at Colne in the County aforesaid:

" To Ambres wolton at Carrie Bridge

" Ambras wolton this to Let you now that I perfeve my Last Letter that I seposed to fall in your way flath miscaried : but I Demmand a catago-" rikel anser Immedetly whether you will set the Body of will" Lonsdel at Liberty or no: and if you Resuse to Comply with this Order be it nown unto you that you will here no more from me till " fuch times as your Blood be upon your Own head for if fuch Villons as you be fufre to go " on in your way it will be past a poor man living " upon the Earth

"I would not have you thto think that you lit fale "for there is you Mr. Ambr. and another which is " called a Justis of peace and there must be sume " Corfe taken with you both Edward Dupont

" Fear walton for as Dogs licked the Blood of Nebat shall Dogs Lick thy Blood

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in Writing and Sending the said threatening Letters, or either of them, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person or Per-sons who actually wrote the same) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, fo that be, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted ROCHFORD. thereof.

And, as a farther Encouragement, Ambrofe Walton, Esq; (the Person to whom the said Letters are directed) doth hereby promise a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person or Persons making such Discovery as aforesaid, (except as before excepted;) to be paid on Conviction of any one of the Offenders.
