St. James's, June 4.

THIS Day being the Anniversary of the King's Birth-Day, there was a very numerous and splendid Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment His Majesty upon the Occasion. At Noon the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired; and in the Evening there was a Ball at Court, and Illuminations, and other publick Demonstrations of Joy, throughout London and Westminster.

St. James's, June 2, 1770.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to the King, that William Venables, of Whitechapel, Butcher, and Richard Rogers, Cabinet-maker, in the Minorities, on Sunday Night last, in their Return Home from Stepney thro' a Lane at the Back of Mile-End Assembly-Room, about Ten o'Clock, were shot dead; and, on the Report of Two Pistols fired, Three Men were seen running, one of whom had on a blue close-bodied Coat, with a black Patch on his Right Cheek, and was of a Middle Stature; another of them was in a Cinnamon-coloured Bath Coat and Fly, of Middle Stature also: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in so cruel and inhuman Murders, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person or Persons who actually committed the said Murders) who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Owen Fox, otherwise Tracey, is about 22 Years of Age, middle-sized and thin, with short lightish brown Hair, born in Ireland, but has been in England since a Child; his Father-in-law keeps a Bum-Boat; he has blue Eyes, a likely Countenance, and wears a blue Coat, Waistcoat and Breeches.
