THE following Address of the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, having been transmitted by the Earl of Glasgow, His Majesty's High Commissioner, to the Earl of Rochford, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has by him been presented to His Majesty: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, embrace with Pleasure an Opportunity which is afforded us by Providence, during our Meeting in the General Assembly, of Congratulating your Majesty on the safe Delivery of the Queen, and the Birth of a Princess.

This happy Event, while it fills our Hearts, as it must do those of all your faithful Subjects, with Joy, gives us fresh Reason to acknowledge the Goodness of God in thus further securing to us, by the Increase of your Royal Family, a long Continuance of those inestimable Blessings, which we have hitherto enjoyed under the Protection of your Majesty's Illustrious House.

While Attempts have been made to disturb the Order of Government, and diminish the Affection of your People towards a Sovereign who is so worthy of their Confidence and Trust, we esteem ourselves happy in being able to assure your Majesty of the firm and unperturbed Loyalty of the People under our Care, and of their taking equal Concern with us, in every Event that is auspicious to your Majesty's Family and Government. Firmly persuaded, that Liberty is only secure when due Reverence to the Laws is preserved, we rejoice in having a Prince, who has shown, that whilst he maintains the most Sacred Regard to the British Constitution, He knows how to support with Propriety the Dignity of the Throne.

That Almighty God may pour down His Blessings on your Majesty, on the Queen, and on all the Royal Family: That He may prolong your Reign in the Midst of National Prosperity, and may establish your Throne in the Hearts of a dutiful People, are the constant and fervent Prayers of,

Your Majesty's most faithful, most obedient, and most loyal Subjects, The Ministers and Elders met in this National Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

St. James's, June 6.

This Day his Excellency the Count de Chatelet, Ambassador Extraordinary from France, had his Audience of Leave of His Majesty.

To which he was introduced by the Right Honorable Lord Viscount Weymouth, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Charles Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

Naples, May 15. Prince Xavier of Saxony is now here; and has received a general Invitation to dine and sup with their Sicilian Majesties.

Turin, May 26. The King of Sardinia, and the whole Court, went to the Veneria on Monday last; and it is thought will stay there a Month.

Copenhagen, May 29. On Sunday Morning last, the Queen Sophia Magdalena, Dowager of Christian the Sixth, and Grand mother to the present King of Denmark, died at the Palace of Christiansbourg, in the 70th Year of her Age.

Paris, June 3. The Fireworks, which were exhibited on Wednesday Evening, in the Place of Louis the XVth, on Occasion of the Dauphin's Marriage, ended in a dismal Catastrophe, by the Crowd all pressing to get away at one and the same Time. Several Persons of the First Condition, who were endeavouring to get to their Carriages, were bruised, and trodden under Foot; and so great was the Confusion, that Coaches were overturned, and Horses smothered: 137 dead Bodies were exposed the next Day, to be owned; among which are two Chevaliers de St. Louis. And such are the Accounts of the Bruised, who died after they were with Difficulty carried Home, that, upon the most moderate Conjectures, at least 300 Persons are supposed to have lost their Lives on this Occasion; but it does not as yet appear, that there are any English among the Number.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to the King, that William Venables, of Whitechapel, Butcher, and Richard Rogers, Cabine-maker, in the Minories, on Sunday Night last, in their Return Home from Stepney through a Lane at the Back of Mile-End Assembly-Room, about Ten o'Clock, were shot dead; and, on the Report of Two Pistols fired, Three Men were seen running, one of whom had on a blue close-bodied Coat, with a black Patch on his Right Cheek, and was of a Middle Stature; another of them was in a Cinnamon-coloured Bath Coat and Fly, of Middle Stature also: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in so cruel and inhuman Murders, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person or Persons who actually committed the said Murders) who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
