St. James's, June 19.

Last Sunday Evening her Royal Highness the young Princess was Christened in the Great Council Chamber by his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury: Her Royal Highness was named Elizabeth. The Sponsors were, the Hereditary Prince of Hesse Cassel, represented by the Earl of Hertford, Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household; the Princess Royal of Sweden, represented by the Countess of Holderness; and the Princess of Nassau Weilburg, represented by the Countess Dowager of Effingham.

St. James's, June 19.

The King has been pleased to grant unto William Barford, Clerk, M. A. the Place and Dignity of a Canon or Prebendary of the Cathedral and Metropolitan Church of Canterbury, void by the Death of Dr. Francis Walwyn, late Prebendary thereof.

Rome, May 19. Dispositions are making for the Pope's going to Castle Candolfo, but he will repair to this City to perform the Functions usual at Whitsuntide, on the Anniversary of his Coronation, and the Procession of Corpus Christi.

The Project for establishing in this City the Factory of East-India Callicoes has been settled and

agreed upon; this Government having fixed a Salary of thirty Crowns per Month to each of the four chief Workmen during Life; and they are to have a fourth Share of the Profit on that Trade.

By the last French Mail, Notice was received here of the Decease of Cardinal de Rohan, by which there are 18 Cardinals Hats vacant.

Florence, May 29. On the 13th Instant, being the Empress Queen's Birth Day, the Great Duke came from the Palace in the Country to that in Town, to receive the Compliments on that Occasion from the Foreign Ministers, the Nobility, and the Military Officers, who appeared in Gala to kiss his Hand; and in the Evening the usual Fire Works were played off, and the Cannon of the Castles were fired.

Last Week the Princess Jablonowski, with a numerous Retinue, arrived here from Rome on her journey to Paris, and on the 15th she was presented to the Great Duke and Dutchess.

On the 27th the Ceremony of Churching of the Great Dutchess was performed with great Formality. Her Royal Highness and the Great Duke came to Town in the Morning for that Purpose; all the Great Officers of the Court and the Chamberlains having had Notice to attend: At 11 o'Clock, the Great Duke went in Form to the Chapel of the Court: The Great Dutchess, in a rich Sedan Chair, with the little Princess on her Lap, was carried through the Apartments, and down the great Stairs, (which were lined with Soldiers) to the Door of the Chapel, attended by her Grand Maitresse, and all the Ladies of Honour. After the Ceremony, peculiar to this Occasion, was over, a Te Deum was sung, during which, there was a triple Discharge of two Battalions that were posted in the Square near the Palace, and the Cannon of the Fortrefs were fired; the whole Court together returned in Procession from the Chapel; after which the Foreign Ministers had an Audience of the Great Dutchess to compliment her on this Occasion; and the Ladies were admitted to kiss her Hand.

On the 18th, the celebrated Statues, which were lately removed from the Villa Medici at Rome, were brought hither, in order to be added to those in the Gallery at Florence.

On the 19th, in the Evening, M. de Trouillet, charged with the Affairs of the French Court, in the Absence of Marquis de Barbantane, gave a splendid Ball to the Nobility of Florence, on Account of the Marriage of the Dauphin.

Paris, June 13. His most Christian Majesty has ordered One Hundred Thousand Livres to be expended towards the Relief of the unfortunate Persons who were hurt, or have lost their Relations in the Confusion on the Night of the City Fire-works.

The Dauphinefs and the Mesdames have also contributed.

The Number of dead, on that Occasion, is said to be in all 712. Among which were Four Monks, Two Abbés, and Twenty-two Persons of Condition. It does not appear that there are any English among the Number.

The Spanish Ambassador gave a very fine Entertainment on Sunday last; to which were invited about Three Hundred Persons. Before Supper there was a Fire-work, and after Supper a Masquerade, which lasted till late the next Day; and at which, it is supposed, there were between Seven and Eight Thousand Persons. Victuals and Drink were given to the Populace; and the Whole was conducted with the greatest Order imaginable.
