

The Dauphinefs and the Mesdames have also contributed.

The Number of dead, on that Occasion, is said to be in all 712. Among which were Four Monks, Two Abbés, and Twenty-two Persons of Condition. It does not appear that there are any English among the Number.

The Spanish Ambassador gave a very fine Entertainment on Sunday last; to which were invited about Three Hundred Persons. Before Supper there was a Fire-work, and after Supper a Masquerade, which lasted till late the next Day; and at which, it is supposed, there were between Seven and Eight Thousand Persons. Victuals and Drink were given to the Populace; and the Whole was conducted with the greatest Order imaginable.
