*Arenjuez, May 31.* On Friday last a Courier arrived here in Six Days from Paris, with the Notification of the Celebration of the Dauphin's Marriage; and the three following Days, viz. the 26th, 27th, and 28th of this Month, the Court was in Gala on that Account: And Yesterday being St. Ferdinand's Day, there was a Grand Gala with Befamanos: All the People of Fashion came from Madrid on this Occasion, and there was a very full and splendid Appearance.

*Rome, June 2.* The Pope has established a new Regulation for the Auditors di Ruota in this City, prescribing to them a Method by which their Assistants are deprived of the Means of betraying their Secrets, or of making known the Sentences of that Tribunal, of which he has fixed the Fees. Cardinal Rezzonico, Treasurer of the Ecclesiastical Chamber, has caused an Edict to be published, forbidding the Exportation of all Sorts of Wool out of the Pope's States, until the Woollen Manufactures, that have been lately established, are sufficiently provided.

A strict Prohibition has been notified throughout the Ecclesiastical State, of the Exportation of all Sorts of Cattle, with Orders to the Farmers to give in an exact Account of the Number and Quality on their Farms.

A Detachment of 250 Soldiers has been drawn

from the Garrisons of Rome and Ferrara, to be added to that of Civita Vecchia, to be near at hand to man the Pope's Frigates and Gallies in that Port on any urgent Occasions.

Last Week M. Almada, the Portuguese Minister, received a Courier from his Court; the Contents of whose Dispatches he communicated, on the 2d Instant, to the Pope; among other Affairs, there was the King's Nomination to all the vacant Bishopricks in that Kingdom, and Letters of Thanks from Count d'Oeyras to the College of Cardinals, in Answer to those of Congratulation which they had written to the late Cardinal his Brother, when promoted to that Dignity.

The French King, at the same Time that he caused his Acknowledgments to be conveyed to the Pope, for complying with his Request to fill up the three vacant Bishopricks in Corsica, left the Choice of them to him; in Consequence of which the Pope has appointed M. de Guernes, (a Frenchman) Bishop of Aleria; the Abbé Stefanini, Bishop of Fagona; and Pere Guasco, Bishop of Nebbio; (both Corsicans.)

On the 28th past, the Pope held a private Confistory, in which he conferred Ten vacant Bishopricks and Archbishopricks, in the Kingdom of Naples, Venice, Malta, and Spain.

On the 29th Cardinal de Bernis, having sent an Invitation to the College of Cardinals, to the Foreign Ministers, and to the principal Nobility and Prelates, entreating their Attendance at the Church of the French Nation, caused a High Mass and Te Deum to be sung for the Marriage of the Dauphin with the Archduchess Maria Antonia of Austria; at which Twenty-seven Cardinals assisted; and in the Afternoon the Pope went privately to visit that Church. On the 30th Cardinal de Bernis gave a Dinner to Sixty Persons, amongst whom were Thirteen Cardinals: That and the two following Evenings the Palaces of the Austrian and French Ministers, and the Houses of all the Dependants on those Courts, were illuminated.

The Magistrates of the Health, on a Suspicion of the Epidemical Sickness at Scutari, have subjected all Vessels from the Bays of Cattaro, Budua, the adjacent Places, and Ragusa, coming to the Ports of Ancona and Civita Vecchia, to Fourteen Days Quarantine. The Grand Master of Malta has confirmed, for Three Years longer, the Bailli de Breteuill in the Embassy from that Order to the Pope.

*Florence, June 9.* Last Week the Great Duke appointed the Knight of Malta Ricci Grand Maitre of the Plate, with a Salary of 500 Crowns per Annum, in the Room of Senator Guadagni, deceased.

neral and Captain Lieutenant of the Great Duke's Life Guards, having obtained His Royal Highness's Leave, retired with his Family to Lorrain, his native Country; he is to enjoy his whole Pay, and to have besides 300 Crowns per Annum, as an Equivalent for Forage.

On the 25th an Edict was published here, by which the Great Duke has suppressed the Privilege of a particular Society of Bakers in this City, who payed an annual Sum of 8000 Crowns; and now permits every Body to sell Bread without Limitation of Weight, Quality, or Price.
