**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, entitled, "An Act for registering the Prices at which Corn is sold in the several Counties of Great Britain, and the Quantity exported and imported," It was enacted, That the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, shall, from Time to Time, appoint a fit Person to receive at the Treasury such Returns of the Prices of Corn, and of the Quantity exported and imported, as by the said Act are directed to be made; the first Appointment to be made before the first Day of August, 1770, and published Eight Times, at the least, in the London Gazette; Notice is therefore hereby given, in Pursuance of the said Act of Parliament, that the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have appointed William Cooke, Esq; to receive, at the Treasury, such Returns of the Prices of Corn, and of the Quantities exported and imported, as are directed by the said Act of Parliament.

*Ile of Mann, July 14.* On the 5th Instant, the Bishop of this Ile gave a Sermon in St. John's Chapel, as usual; and afterwards, at the Head of the Clergy, presented the following Address to the Governor; who, after answering their Address, proceeded with them to the Tynwald Hill, and went through the accustomed Ceremonies and Business of the Day, which gave the utmost Satisfaction to above Ten Thousand People present, and univervally to the whole Island; it being the first High Court of Tynwald that has been holden there since the said Island has been vested in His Majesty.

To his Excellency John Wood, Esq; Governor in Chief and Captain-General of the Island and Dominion of Mann, and the Dependencies thereof. The Humble Address of the Bishop, Archdeacon, and the rest of the Clergy of the Ile and Diocese of Sodor and Mann.

*May it please your Excellency,*  
**W**E the Bishop, Archdeacon, and Clergy of the Ile and Diocese of Sodor and Mann, animated with the warmest Sentiments of Duty, Loyalty, and Affection to the Person and Government of our Gracious Sovereign, and the highest Respect to your Excellency, embrace this Opportunity, at this First and Solemn Court of Tynwald, (since the Royalities of this Island were annexed to the Imperial Crown of Great Britain) to congratulate your Excellency on the Royal Favor of being commissioned His Majesty's Vicegerent in the Government of this Ile; and to felicitate this Island in general, on your Excellency's happy Appointment at the late Revolution; as no Circumstance could have been more

favorable to the Peace and Happiness of the People committed to your Care at that Conjunction, than His Majesty's wise and seasonable Continuance of your Excellency to the Government of this Land, where your prudent and equable Administration, during several previous Years, had so justly endeared your Excellency to all the Inhabitants thereof.

Permit us therefore, Sir, to participate in the general Joy, this Day conspicuous in every Face, to see their ancient, supreme, constitutional, and so much wished for Court of Tynwald, restored to its former, or rather, superior Dignity and Importance, under your Excellency's wise and judicious Direction. And we beg Leave to assure your Excellency, that we shall, by a faithful Discharge of our Duty in our respective Stations, inculcate the strictest Principles of Loyalty and Duty to His Majesty, and cheerful Obedience to all those put in Authority under Him; and more especially shall offer up our earnest Supplications to the Throne of Grace, that the Supreme Director of all Things would extend the Blessings of Peace and Unity through this and every other Part of His Majesty's Dominions; that your Excellency's Rule over us may be long, prosperous, and happy; with Health, Honour, and Wisdom to discharge the arduous Duties of your Station; and that His Majesty may never want so faithful a Representative, the Church so sincere a Well-wisher, or this Island so acceptable a Governor.

To which the Governor returned the following Answer.

My Lord Bishop,

**I** AM bound in Duty to thank your Lordship for your warm Expressions of Affection and Loyalty to His Majesty's Person and Government; as I am no less in Gratitude

*This public Testimony of your Regard for me, at the Head of so respectable a Body, on this great Occasion, is of all Things the most flattering; and must be so, when I consider your Lordship's distinguishing Judgment; when I know the Sincerity of your Love for the People of this Island; and your unwearied Endeavours to promote their Happiness both here and hereafter.*

*Your Applause, my Lord, reflects a Virtue on myself, and makes me proud indeed.*

Mr. Archdeacon, and Gentlemen of the Clergy,

*Your Zeal, on this Occasion, calls alike for my most thankful Acknowledgments: The exemplary Conduct of your Lives, your strict Attention to the Exercise of your Sacred Functions, leave me no Room to doubt of your Loyalty to the Crown, and your Fidelity to my Person. To deserve your Esteem has ever been my peculiar Study; to preserve it shall be my constant Care. The same wise Providence, which has inspired your Goodness, will, I doubt not, teach me, as far as I am able, to encourage and to reward its Labours.*

Turin July 21. His Sardinian Majesty went this Day to Aglié, the Seat of his Royal Highness the Duke of Chablais, where he proposes staying till Monday Evening.

Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Savoy are still at Moncalier; and, as the Waters they are drinking there, perfectly agree with them, they propose staying there till the End of this Month.

Paris, July 30. Letters from St. Domingo confirm the melancholy Account of the Calamity which happened there on the 3d of last Month. It is said that the Earthquake extended 35 Leagues; the Sea rose a League and a half up into the Island; a River is choaked up, and in a Manner almost lost; four Towns almost destroyed; and the Sugar-Works demolished. Fortunately it happened between Seven and Eight o'Clock in the Evening, when most of the Inhabitants were out of their Houses; but the Number of White Persons lost are above Four hundred. The Fortunes of several great Families in this Country must have suffered by it.
