WHEREAS By an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, entitled, "An Act for registering the Prices at which Corn is sold in the several Counties of Great Britain, and the Quantity exported and imported," It was enacted, That the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, shall, from Time to Time, appoint a fit Person to receive at the Treasury such Returns of the Prices of Corn, and of the Quantity exported and imported, as by the said Act are directed to be made; the first Appointment to be made before the first Day of August, 1770, and published Eight Times, at the least, in the London Gazette; Notice is therefore hereby given, in Pursuance of the said Act of Parliament, that the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have appointed William Cooke, Esq; to receive, at the Treasury, such Returns of the Prices of Corn, and of the Quantities exported and imported, as are directed by the said Act of Parliament.

Rome, July 14. By the Brief which the Pope lately granted to the Bishops in the Spanish Indies, he authorises them to permit Marriages in the 2d and 3d Degrees of Consanguinity, to avoid the frequent Inconveniences that happen amongst the Relations in these Parts.

The Pope, at the Request of the Great Duke of Tuscany, has conferred upon the Abbé Vannucci the vacant Bishoprick of Massa in the State of Siena.

Cardinal de Bernis, by order of the French-King his Master, has presented to the Pope some Gold Medals, representing the Marriage of the Dauphin of France with the Archduchess Maria Antonia of Austria; which Medals the Pope has caused to be deposited in the Museum at the Vatican.

The King of Spain has appointed M. Clementi, his late Minister Plenipotentiary to the Court of Naples, to be Commissary of the Tribunal of the Crociata, of the yearly Income of 14,000 Dollars; and has likewise promoted him to the Dignity of Archdean of the Cathedral Church of Toledo.

On the 7th Instant arrived here Count d'Harscian the new Auditor of the Ruota for the German Nation; and on the 9th, he was, by Cardinal Alexander Albani, introduced to an Audience of the Pope.

On the 12th, M. Aspuru, the Spanish Minister, had an Audience of the Pope, as Archbishop of Valencia; since his dangerous Illness he has been dispensed with from transacting the Affairs of his Court, the Care of which has been committed to Cardinal de Bernis till the Arrival of Cardinal de Solis from Spain.

Florence, July 21. A few Days ago Prince Xavier of Saxony and the Marchioness Spinucci arrived from Rome at Siena, where they propose to pass the Summer.

On the 20th Instant, Count Kaunitz and his Lady set out on their Journey to Vienna.

Cartagena, July 21. The Master of a French Bark, lately arrived from Algiers, reports, that on the 4th of this Month appeared off that Place four Danish Ships of the Line, two large Frigates, and two Bomb Vessels, all with White Flags. The Dey desired the French Consul to go off with the Captain of the Port, to know their Business; when the Danish Commander delivered a Packet from the King his Master for the Dey of Algiers, which was carried to him, and contained the following Demands: That the Dey should immediately return the Vessels and their Crews, which had been made Prize of by the Algerine Corsairs; and that he should pay the Expences of that Squadron's Equipment; both which the Dey very peremptorily refused, and ordered the Castle on the Mole to fire on the Ships. On the 5th in the Evening, the Danes began to bombard the Town; and the next Morning having formed the Squadron in a Line, the Cannonade began. The Algerines had thrown several Shells, but as yet they had done no Damage to the Ships. In this Situation the Frenchman left them on the 6th of this Month, and we have since no farther Advice of their Proceedings.

Stockholm, July 24. Last Saturday in the Afternoon the King of Sweden arrived in the Park near this Place, where his Majesty was pleased to see the Regiment of Artillery perform their Evolutions; after which he returned directly to Dronningholm.

Liamburgh, August 3. The President of Altona has received Orders to make the necessary Preparations for the Reception of the King and Queen of Denmark by Tuesday next. It is said their Danish Majesties will return from Aeschberg to Travendahl To-day.

Campeigne, August 5. The Dauphin and Dauphiness came hither on Monday last. The Dauphin is perfectly recovered from his late Illness.

Whereas, about Four o'Clock in the Morning of Friday the 27th Day of July last, a dreadful Fire broke out in His Majesty's Dock Yard at Portsmouth, which raged with such Violence, that before the same could be extinguished, several of His Majesty's Storehouses and Buildings were burnt down, and great Quantities of Naval Stores totally consumed and destroyed, and others greatly damaged; And whereas there is Reason to suspect that the said Buildings and Stores were wilfully and maliciously set on Fire, by some evil-disposed Persons, at present unknown: In order therefore to discover, and bring to Justice, the Persons guilty of the abovementioned Offence, My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are pleased to promise a Reward of ONE THOUSAND POUNDS unto, or amongst, such Person, or Persons, as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any of the Offenders guilty of the said Offence, so as such Offenders, or any one or more of them, shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof; the said Reward to be paid clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by the Treasurer of His Majesty's Navy, immediately after the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.

And, as a further Encouragement, His Majesty is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any of the said Offenders, (except the Person who actually set the Premises on Fire) who shall discover any one or more of his or their Accomplices in the said Offence, so as he or they shall be apprehended and prosecuted to Conviction.
