to promise a Reward of ONE THOUSAND
POUNDS unto, or amongs, such Person, or Persons,
as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any of the Offenders quilty of the said Offence, so ver any of the Offenders guilty of the said Offence, so as such Offenders, or any one or more of them, shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof; the said Reword to be paid clear of al! Deductions whatforver,

HEREAS by an Act passed in the by the Treasurer of His Majest's Navy, immediately

after the Conviction of Juch Off nder or Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, His Majesty is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any of the said Offenders, (except the Person who actually set the Premisses on Fire) who shall discover any one of more of his or their Accomplices in the Said Offence, so as he er they shall be apprehended and projecuted to Conviction.
