WHEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, entituled, "An Act for registering the Prices at which Corn is sold in the several Counties of Great Britain, and the Quantity exported and imported," It was enacted, That the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, shall, from Time to Time, appoint a fit Person to receive at the Treasury such Returns of the Prices of Corn, and of the Quantity exported and imported, as by the said Act are directed to be made; the first Appointment to be made before the first Day of August, 1770, and published Eight Times, at the least, in the London Gazette; Notice is therefore hereby given, in Pursuance of the said Act of Parliament, that the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have appointed William Cooke, Esq; to receive, at the Treasury, such Returns of the Prices of Corn, and of the Quantities exported and imported, as are directed by the said Act of Parliament.

Constantinople, July 3. A Fire broke out in an empty House in the Greeks Quarter on the 27th past, which consumed near Three hundred Houses.

Mabon, July 27. On the 21st and 22d Instant, his Danish Majesty's Fleet, consisting of Four Ships of the Line, two Frigates, 2 Bombs, two armed Store-ships, and a Packet, commanded by Admiral Kaas, arrived in this Port from Algiers, after having bombarded that Place. The Dey informed the Admiral, if he would depart with his Fleet he would make Peace upon reasonable Terms, and accordingly the English and French Consuls have undertaken the Negotiation. The farther Operations of this Fleet depend upon those Gentlemens Deliberations.

Warsaw, July 28. The best Accounts from Kamnic and those Quarters assure us, that the Dis-

temper which rages there is not the Plague, but a putrid Fever, which does not appear to be so general or destructive as was at first represented. All imaginable Care was immediately taken here to prevent its spreading.

Turin, August 4. Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Dutchess of Savoy return hither this Evening from Moncalier; and on Monday his Royal Highness the Duke of Chablais will set out on a Tour for a Month, to view the Fortifications and other Places in the Mountains.

Berlin, August 14. Yesterday Morning early the Princess Royal of Prussia was safely brought to Bed of a Prince; which joyful Event was soon after made known to the People here by a triple Discharge of Artillery. Her Royal Highness and the young Prince are as well as can be expected.

Admiralty-Office, August 7, 1770.

Whereas, about Four o'Clock in the Morning of Friday the 27th Day of July last, a dreadful Fire broke out in His Majesty's Dock Yard at Portsmouth, which raged with such Violence, that before the same could be extinguished, several of His Majesty's Storehouses and Buildings were burnt down, and great Quantities of Naval Stores totally consumed and destroyed, and others greatly damaged; And whereas there is Reason to suspect that the said Buildings and Stores were wilfully and maliciously set on Fire, by some evil-disposed Persons, at present unknown: In order therefore to discover, and bring to Justice, the Persons guilty of the abovementioned Offence, My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are pleased to promise a Reward of ONE THOUSAND POUNDS unto, or amongst, such Person, or Persons, as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any of the Offenders guilty of the said Offence, so as such Offenders, or any one or more of them, shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof; the said Reward to be paid clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by the Treasurer of His Majesty's Navy, immediately after the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, His Majesty is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any of the said Offenders, (except the Person who actually set the Premises on Fire) who shall discover any one or more of his or their Accomplices in the said Offence, so as he or they shall be apprehended and prosecuted to Conviction.
