WHEREAS His Majesty hath signified unto Us His Royal Pleasure, That the Parliament of this Kingdom, which now stands prorogued to Tuesday the Twenty-eighth Day of this Instant August, be further prorogued to Tuesday the Sixteenth Day of October next; We do therefore publish and declare, that the said Parliament be, and accordingly the said Parliament is, hereby, further prorogued to Tuesday the Sixteenth Day of October next: Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this present Parliament, are to take Notice accordingly. GOD save the KING.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, entitled, "An Act for registering the Prices at which Corn is sold in the several Counties of Great Britain, and the Quantity exported and imported," It was enacted, That the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, shall, from Time to Time, appoint a fit Person to receive at the Treasury such Returns of the Prices of Corn, and of the Quantity exported and imported, as by the said Act are directed to be made; the first Appointment to be made before the first Day of August, 1770, and published Eight Times, at the least, in the London Gazette; Notice is therefore hereby given, in Pursuance of the said Act of Parliament, that the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have appointed William Cooke, Esq; to receive, at the Treasury, such Returns of the Prices of Corn, and of the Quantities exported and imported, as are directed by the said Act of Parliament.

Berlin, August 18. Some Days ago Prince Wolkonsky, the Russian Ambassador at Warsaw, passed through this City, in his Return to Carlsbad to that Court, and had an Audience of his Prussian Majesty at Potsdam.

On the 13th, her Serene Highness the Landgravine of Hesse Darmstadt, Mother to the Princess Royal of Prussia, having taken Leave of the Queen and Royal Family, set out from hence on her Return Home, after a Stay of two Months at Potsdam.

Brussels, August 21. On Sunday Evening arrived here his Royal Highness Prince Charles of Sweden, and Yesterday, early in the Morning, he set out for Mons to see the Review of the Troops there, which was to be that Day. His Royal Highness returns here to-day with the Prince of Starhemberg, and, it is said, he will go directly to Paris.

Last Wednesday the 15th, the King of Prussia, accompanied by the Prince Royal and Prince Ferdinand of Prussia, set out from Potsdam for Silesia, in order to review and manœuvre the Troops in that Province: After which, that Monarch will pay a Visit to the Emperor, at his Camp near Neustadt in Moravia, which is said to consist of thirty-six Battalions of Infantry, and thirty-four Squadrons of Cavalry. His Prussian Majesty will, it is thought, return about the 20th of September to Potsdam, where, we hear, the Electress Dowager of Saxony, intends to pay him a Visit on the 25th of that Month.

Whereas, about Four o'Clock in the Morning of Friday the 27th Day of July last, a dreadful Fire broke out in His Majesty's Dock Yard at Portsmouth, which raged with such Violence, that before the same could be extinguished, several of His Majesty's Storehouses and Buildings were burnt down, and great Quantities of Naval Stores totally consumed and destroyed, and others greatly damaged; And whereas there is Reason to suspect that the said Buildings and Stores were wilfully and maliciously set on Fire, by some evil-

disposed Persons, at present unknown: In order therefore to discover, and bring to Justice, the Persons guilty of the above-mentioned Offence, My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are pleased to promise a Reward of ONE THOUSAND POUNDS unto, or amongst, such Person, or Persons, as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any of the Offenders guilty of the said Offence, so as such Offenders, or any one or more of them, shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof; the said Reward to be paid clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by the Treasurer of His Majesty's Navy, immediately after the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.
