Rome, August 11.

ON the 6th Instant the Pope held a Private Consistory, in which he notified to the College of Cardinals, the Reconciliation he had happily concluded with the Court of Portugal, and created Cardinal, by the Nomination of his Faithful Majesty, the Bishop of Evora, (to whom M. Lambertini is appointed to carry the Cardinal's Cap.) Then the Pope conferred eight vacant Bishopricks, and promoted M. Cenaculo to the Bishoprick of Begia, and M. de Minez to that of Braganza, the two Bishopricks which the King has lately established in Portugal. The Pope conferred also on M. St. Agnese the Metropolitan Church of the Brazils, and has appointed M. de Caelho, (the Archbishop in partibus of Lacedaemonia) Suffragan of Lisbon. He afterwards filled up Eleven vacant Bishopricks and Ecclesiastical Benefices in different Countries; amongst which is the Coadjutorship to the Provost of Elvaghien, in Favour of Prince Clement of Saxony, Elector of Treves.

The Pope has conferred on M. Delci, Auditor General of the Ecclesiastical Chamber, the vacant Abbey of Anghiari in Tuscany.

Naples, August 14. Prince Marsiconuovo, instead of going Minister from this Court to that of Vienna, as was intended, has been appointed Regent of the Vicaria; and the Marquis Sambucca is named Minister Plenipotentiary to the Court of Vienna.

M. Cavallo has had a private Audience of their Sicilian Majesties to present his Credential Letters, as Resident at this Court from the Republick of Venice.

Rome, August 18. On the 13th Instant, being the Queen of Naples's Birth-day, Cardinal Orsini was complimented on that Occasion by the Cardinals, Subjects and Feudataries of the Two Sicilies. The Foreign Ministers paid also the same Compliment to Cardinal Orsini, on that Occasion.

The Pope, by the Nomination of the King of Poland, has conferred upon M. Turfki the vacant Bishoprick of Luccorio in Poland.

On the 14th Instant, M. Almada, the Portuguese Minister, dispatched a Courier to his Court with the Bulls for supplying the vacant Bishopricks in that Kingdom, conferred by the Pope in his last Consistory.

Florence, August 18. From Vienna we are informed, that the Great Duke has appointed Count Piccolomini, a Tuscan, (formerly Member of the Council of Tuscany at Vienna) the Fourth Counsellor of State at Florence, with the Department of the Foreign Courts.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of the Death of the late Emperor, the Funeral Obsequies were per-

formed with the usual Formality in the Chapel of the Palace.

Florence, August 25. This being the Great Dutchess's Name day, the Marquise Albizzi, Grande Maitresse of the young Arch-dukes, sent an Invitation by an Harbinger of the Court, to the Foreign Ministers, and a Notification to the Nobility who have the Privilege of the Antichamber, that those Princes will receive their Compliments, from Ten to Twelve, on that Occasion.

Admiralty-Office, August 7, 1770.

Whereas, about Four o'Clock in the Morning of Friday the 27th Day of July last, a dreadful Fire broke out in His Majesty's Dock Yard at Portsmouth, which raged with such Violence, that before the same could be extinguished, several of His Majesty's Storehouses and Buildings were burnt down, and great Quantities of Naval Stores totally consumed and destroyed, and others greatly damaged; And whereas there is Reason to suspect that the said Buildings and Stores were wilfully and maliciously set on Fire, by some evil-disposed Persons, at present unknown: In order therefore to discover, and bring to Justice, the Persons guilty of the abovementioned Offence, My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are pleased to promise a Reward of ONE THOUSAND POUNDS unto, or amongst, such Person, or Persons, as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any of the Offenders guilty of the said Offence, so as such Offenders, or any one or more of them, shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof; the said Reward to be paid clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by the Treasurer of His Majesty's Navy, immediately after the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.

And, as a further Encouragement, His Majesty is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any of the said Offenders, (except the Person who actually set the Premises on Fire) who shall discover any one or more of his or their Accomplices in the said Offence, so as he or they shall be apprehended and prosecuted to Conviction.
