A PROCLAMATION,

For Encouraging Seamen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS it is Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all such Seamen, who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation: And We do hereby promise and declare, That all such able Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who shall, on or before the Twenty-first Day of October next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders, as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of Our Navy, shall receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man: And all such Ordinary Seamen fit for Our Service, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Twenty Shillings each Man, as Our Royal Bounty; such respective Sums to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Cheque, residing at the Ports or Places where the Ships, into which they shall be entered, shall be, immediately after the third Muster of such Seamen. — And We do declare, that the Qualifications of the Seamen, so entering themselves as aforesaid, shall be certified by the Captain, Master and Boatwain of the Ship or Vessel where they shall enter. And for Prevention of any Abuses, by any Persons leaving the Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty Money; We do hereby declare and command, That such Seamen, belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on Board any other of Our said Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits.

Given at Our Court at *St. James's*, the Twenty-second Day of *September*, 1770, and in the Tenth Year of Our Reign.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Order of Council of the 26th Day of May, 1769, to prohibit the Importation of any Hides of Horned Cattle either Raw or Salted, or Horns and Hoofs, from the Dominions of the Kings of Denmark and Sweden, the Duchies of Holstein, Mecklenburgh and Cleves, the Neighbourhood of Hamburg, the Frontiers of the United Provinces, and the United Provinces: And whereas by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to prevent the further Spreading of the contagious Disorder among the Horned Cattle in Great Britain," His Majesty is empowered, amongst other Things, from Time to Time, as often as he shall find it necessary so to do, by His Royal Proclamation, to be issued by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, or by His Order in Council to be published in the London Gazette, to prohibit generally, or from any particular Country or Counties, or from the Isles of Alderney, Jersey, Guernsey, or any of the Islands or Dominions belonging to Great Britain, the Importation of any Cattle, or of any Manner of Hides or Skins, Horns or Hoofs, or any other Part of any Cattle or Beast, into the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, or any of the Islands or Dominions thereto belonging; — And whereas His Majesty hath received Information that the Contagion amongst the Horned Cattle hath broke out at a Village called Werlpen, between Furnes and Newport, about Four Leagues from Ostend, in Flanders; and is supposed to have come from the Side of Berg St. Wenox, about Two Leagues from Dunkirk, where it actually is; His Majesty taking the same into his Royal Consideration, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to prohibit the Importation of any Cattle, or of any Manner of Hides or Skins, Horns or Hoofs, or any other Part of any Cattle or Beast, from Dunkirk, or any other Part of Flanders, or from any of the Places mentioned in the aforesaid Order of the 26th of May, 1769, into the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, until His Majesty's Pleasure shall be further signified: And His Majesty is further pleased, with the Advice aforesaid, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the utmost Care be taken, not to permit any Entry to be passed, for any Cattle, or for any Manner of Hides or Skins, Horns or Hoofs, or any other Part of any Cattle or Beast, which are already, or may hereafter be brought from the Places aforementioned, directly or indirectly, into any of the Ports of Great Britain or Ireland, until His Majesty's Pleasure shall be further signified: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lord Lieutenant of His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Naples, August 28. Their Sicilian Majesties continue in perfect Health at their Palace in this Capital.

Rome, Sept. 1. On the 24th at Night the Galley Slaves at Civita Vecchia, being 1400 in Number, found Means to get off their Chains, and were actually employed in digging a Hole under the Wall

Wall of the Town, which they designed to plunder, and then to put to Ser. The Commanding Officer immediately assembled a sufficient Number of Troops, who fired upon them with Muskets and Grenades, and the Artillery of the Fortrefs, by which Means they were soon subdued. Eight of them were killed, and twenty-two dangerously wounded; the rest submitted to be conducted back to the Place of their Confinement.

Turin, Sept. 8. His Royal Highness the Duke of Chablais arrived here Yesterday Morning from Nice, about Nine o'Clock, in perfect Health.

The King of Sardinia and the whole Court go To-morrow Morning to Stupiniggi, and propose staying there till Friday next.

St. James's, September 15, 1770.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to the King, that by an Act of Parliament made in the Seventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for dividing of the Haute Huntre, Eight Hundred, or Holland Fen, and certain other commonable Places adjoining thereto, in the Parts of Holland in the County of Lincoln, Commissioners were empowered to divide the said Fen amongst the several Townships, Places, and Persons which had Right of Common and other Interest therein, who did divide the same accordingly; but that divers malicious and evil minded Persons, in order to obstruct and hinder the Execution of the said Act, have, in the Night Time, at several different Times, shot into several Dwelling Houses with an Intent to commit Murder, burnt several Houses, Outhouses, Buildings, and Stacks of Hay and Corn, killed, wounded, poisoned, and destroyed many Horses, Beasts, and Sheep, and written several threatening and incendiary Letters to many Persons interested in, and whom they think Well-Wishers to, the Division of the said Fen; His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in such Felonies, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

N. B. The above Rewards are offered in Lieu of all Rewards formerly promised by the said Edward Draper, or any other Person or Persons, for the Discovery of the Perpetrators of the above Crimes or Offences, or any of them; and further, all such Informers may depend on every reasonable Protection.

Whereas, about Four o'Clock in the Morning of Friday the 27th Day of July last, a dreadful Fire broke out in His Majesty's Dock Yard at Portsmouth, which raged with such Violence, that before the same could be extinguished, several of His Majesty's Storehouses and

Buildings were burnt down, and great Quantities of Naval Stores totally consumed and destroyed, and others greatly damaged; And whereas there is Reason to suspect that the said Buildings and Stores were maliciously and maliciously set on Fire, by some evil-disposed Persons, at present unknown: In order therefore to discover, and bring to Justice, the Persons guilty of the abovementioned Offence, My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are pleased to promise a Reward of ONE THOUSAND POUNDS unto, or amongst, such Person, or Persons, as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any of the Offenders guilty of the said Offence, so as such Offenders, or any one or more of them, shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof; the said Reward to be paid clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by the Treasurer of His Majesty's Navy, immediately after the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.

And, as a further Encouragement, His Majesty is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any of the said Offenders, (except the Person who actually set the Premises on Fire) who shall discover any one or more of his or their Accomplices in the said Offence, so as he or they shall be apprehended and prosecuted to Conviction.
