GEORGE R.
THEREAS it is Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all fuch beamen, who shall volunta.ly enter themselves in Our Service; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation: And We do hereby promife and declare, That all fech able Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Scr-vice, who shall, on or before the I wenty-first Day of October next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board foch Tenders, as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of Our Navy, thall receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man: And all-fuch Ordinary Seamen fit for Our Service, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, hall receive the Sum of Twenty Shillings each Man, as Our Royal Bounty; fuch respective Sums to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Cheque, saiding at the Ports or Places where the Ships, into which they shall be entered, shall be, im mediately after the third Muster of such Seamen.

— And We do declare, that the Qualifications of the Seamen, fo entering themselves as afore-faid, shall be certified by the Captain. Master and Boatswain of the Ship or Vestel where they shall enter. And for Prevention of any Abuses, by any Perions leaving the Veffels to which they shall belong, and entering themfelves on Board any other Our Ships or Veffels, in order to obtain the faid Bounty Money; We do hereby declare and command, That fuch Seamen, belonging to any of Our Ships or Vesseis, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall bejong, and shall enter themselves on Board any other of Our said Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerity.
