## A PROCLAMATION,

**W**HEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to Tuesday the Thirteenth Day of November next; We, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall, on the said Thirteenth Day of November next, be held and sit for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs. And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgeses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required to give their Attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said Thirteenth Day of November next.

Given at Our Court at *St. James's*, the Twenty-sixth Day of *September*, 1770, in the Tenth Year of Our Reign.

GOD save the KING.

*Copy of a Message sent by the Emperor of Morocco to Colonel Boyd, Lieutenant Governor of Gibraltar.*

By the High and Glorious Monarch, the Mighty and Right Noble Prince Sidi Mahomet Ben Abdalla, Emperor of the Kingdoms of Fes and Morocco, Tafilet, Sus, and all the Algarve and its Territories in Africa.

**N**otwithstanding that we hold ourselves accountable for our Actions to none but the Almighty, yet, being desirous that the just Motives for our Conduct, in the severe Punishment of Abdesadak Ben-Hamet, our Servant, and late Governor of Tanjar, may be made known to all Nations, we do hereby signify our Request, that you will cause the same to be printed, published and declared, in the Publick News-Papers, viz.

That when said Abdesadak first came to our Royal Court, riding on a Baggage-horse, we took him into Favour, and made him our Governor of Tanjar and its Dominions; but he the said Abdesadak Ben-Ha-

met, unmindful of our Royal Bounty, became elated with Pride, and possessed with the cursed Thirst of Gain, and, instead of maintaining his Troops or repairing our Fortifications, he expended our Treasures in building and adorning Palaces for his own Private Use and Pleasure; And particularly, that about two Years since, a Danish Ship, bound from Ostend for Cadiz, was, by tempestuous Weather, driven on our Coast at Tanjar, where, and at all other our Ports, we had given strict Orders to our Governors, that, in every Case where the Ships of the Nations we are at Peace with, should be driven ashore, our said Governors should assist and protect the People, and with all Care should save the Cargoes, and restore them untouched to the Owners: In consequence of which Orders, the Basnaa of Duquela, our Minister, dispatched some of his own Soldiers to prevent any Person from Plundering the Cargo of said Danish Ship; But our late Alcaid Abdesadak, instead of assisting to carry our said Orders into Execution, did himself plunder, and suffered his own People to plunder, said Cargo; and the Soldiers of our said Minister endeavouring to prevent this Violation of our Orders, several Skirmishes ensued between them and the Soldiers of the Basnaa, in which some of the former were killed.

Also, said Abdesadak took a Diamond Ring from the Person on whom we had thought proper to bestow the same, giving him a small Value for it, and not regarding the Respect due to a Thing that had been our's.

And we having received many other Complaints of the unjust and violent Conduct of our said late Alcaid, who presented himself at our Court at Mequinez on the 15th Day of July last, with Forty-five of his Companions, at our Publick Audience: And we, duly considering his disloyal and ungrateful Procedure, actuated by that Love of Justice with which Kings are inspired, have thought fit to punish him with Severity, by deposing him from his Office, putting him in a strong Prison, and ordering his Family, and all other the Inhabitants of Tanjar, to other Parts of our Imperial Dominions, and have sent Five Thousand Soldiers to inhabit at Tanjar, where we have ordered the Mole to be repaired, and Ten Galliots and Six Gallies to be built, to command the Straits.

Name, or Title whatsoever; and any Person who shall sell any Chance in the present State Lottery, or receive any Money whatsoever in Consideration of the Re-payment of any Sum or Sums of Money, in case any Ticket in the said Lottery shall prove fortunate; all and every such Persons being convicted on the Oath or Oaths of one or more credible Witnesses or Witnesses, by two or more Justices of the Peace, will forfeit the several Sums of Five Hundred Pounds and Two Hundred Pounds, as in the said Acts is expressed, over and above all former Penalties; and all and every Person or Persons, who shall be Contributors to, or Adventurers in, any such Sales, Lotteries, Proposals or Schemes aforesaid, will be liable to pay the Sum of Fifty Pounds, and all other the Penalties by Act of Parliament inflicted: And the said Managers and Directors do hereby give publick Notice to all Persons whatsoever, that all Offenders against the said Acts will be prosecuted with the utmost Severity; and for the Information of the Publick, they here insert two Clauses out of an Act of Parliament passed in the 8th Year of His present Majesty, viz. "And be it further enacted, by the Authority aforesaid, that no Person or Persons shall sell the Chance or Chances of any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, or any Share or Shares of any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, for a Day or Part of a Day, or for a longer Time less than the whole Time of drawing the Lottery then to come, or shall receive any Money whatsoever in Consideration of the Re-payment of any Sum or Sums of Money, in Case any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery shall prove fortunate, or shall lay any Wager relating to the drawing of any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, either as to the Time of such Ticket or Tickets being drawn, or whether such Ticket or Tickets be drawn fortunate or unfortunate; and all and every Person and Persons, who shall offend in any of the said Matters, shall forfeit and pay treble the Sum and Sums of Money which shall have been received by such Person and Persons contrary to the true Intent and Meaning of this Act, to be recovered by Action of Debt, Bill, Plaint or Information, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, in which no Essoin, Protection, Privilege or Wager of Law, or more than one Imparance shall be allowed; one Moiety whereof to be for the Use of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, and the other Moiety to be paid to the Person or Persons who shall sue for the same; and every such Sale, Wager or Contract, and every Agreement relating thereto, shall be, and is hereby declared null and void."

"And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, that if any Person or Persons shall keep any Office or Offices, or shall print or publish any Scheme or Proposal for receiving any Sum or Sums of Money, in Consideration of any Interest to be granted for the same, in any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, whereof such Person or Persons shall not then be actually possessed, or in Consideration of any Sum or Sums of Money to be repayed, in case any Ticket or Number of Tickets in the said Lottery, which shall not be in the actual Possession of such Person or Persons, shall prove fortunate or unfortunate; all and every such Person and Persons shall forfeit and pay the Sum of Five Hundred Pounds, to be recovered by Action of Debt, Bill, Plaint, or Information, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, in which no Essoin, Protection, Wager of Law, or more than one Imparance shall be allowed; one Moiety whereof to be for the Use of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, and the other Moiety to be paid to the Person or Persons who shall sue for the same, and also shall suffer three Months Imprisonment without Bail or Mainprize.

Whereas, about Four o'Clock in the Morning of Friday the 27th Day of July last, a dreadful Fire broke out in His Majesty's Dock Yard at Portsmouth, which raged with such Violence, that before the same could be extinguished, several of His Majesty's Storehouses and Buildings were burnt down, and great Quantities of Naval Stores totally consumed and destroyed, and others greatly damaged; And whereas there is Reason to suspect that the said Buildings and Stores were wilfully and maliciously set on Fire, by some evil-disposed Persons, at present unknown: In order therefore to discover, and bring to Justice, the Persons guilty of the abovementioned Offence, My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are pleased to promise a Reward of ONE THOUSAND POUNDS unto, or amongst, such Person, or Persons, as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any of the Offenders guilty of the said Offence, so as such Offenders, or any one or more of them, shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof; the said Reward to be paid clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by the Treasurer of His Majesty's Navy, immediately after the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.

And, as a further Encouragement, His Majesty is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any of the said Offenders, (except the Person who actually set the Premises on Fire) who shall discover any one or more of his or their Accomplices in the said Offence, so as he or they shall be apprehended and prosecuted to Conviction.

This Morning, about a Quarter before Four o'Clock, the Post-Boy, carrying the Chester Mail from this Office, was attacked and robbed at the Foot of Highbury Hill, by a single Highwayman, who took out of the Cart a small Mail ticketed Chester B. B. containing the following Bags of Letters, viz.

Barnet, St. Albans, Dunstable, Fenny Stratford, Stony Stratford, Daventry, Rugby, Luton, Towcester, Ampthill, and Bedford.

The Person who committed this Robbery is described to be a tall thin Man, about Five Feet Nine Inches high, dressed in a light coloured close bodied Coat, dark Waistcoat, white Breeches, Boots and Spurs, a round Hat turned up only behind, and well mounted on a black Horse, about fourteen Hands and an Half high, with two white Feet before, and a cut Tail.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, over and above the Reward by Act of Parliament for apprehending Highwaymen: Or, if any Person, whether an Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery whereby the Person who committed the same may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of the Person who committed this Robbery, be intitled to the said Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, and will also receive His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
