A PROCLAMATION,

*For Recalling and Prohibiting Seamen from serving Foreign Princes and States; for giving further Encouragement to Seamen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War; and for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves.*

**W**HEREAS We are informed, That great Numbers of Mariners and Seafaring Men, Our natural-born Subjects, are in the Service of divers Foreign Princes and States, to the Prejudice of Our Kingdom; We have therefore thought it necessary, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and do hereby strictly charge and command all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever and wheresoever (being Our natural-born Subjects) who are in the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or do serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel, that forthwith they, and every of them, do (according to their known and bounden Duty and Allegiance) withdraw themselves, depart from, and quit such Foreign Services, and return Home to their native Countries: And farther, We do hereby strictly prohibit and forbid all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever (being Our natural-born Subjects) from entering, and do charge and command them, and every of them, from henceforth, to forbear to enter themselves into the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or to serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel whatsoever, without Our special Licence first had and obtained in that Behalf; to all which We expect due Obedience, and exact Conformity. And We do hereby publish and declare, That the Offenders to the contrary shall not only incur Our just Displeasure, but be proceeded against for their Contempt, according to the utmost Severities of the Law. And We do hereby declare, That if any such Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, or other Seafaring Men (being Our Subjects) shall be taken in any Foreign Service, by the Turks, Algierines, or any others, they shall not be reclaimed by Us as Subjects of Great-Britain. And Whereas by Our Royal Proclamation, dated the Twenty-second Day of September last, intituled, A Proclamation for encouraging Seamen to enter themselves on board His Majesty's Ships of War, We were graciously pleased to promise, That every Able Seaman, and every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who should voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, on or before the Twenty-first Day of this Instant October, in such Manner as in Our said Proclamation is expressed, should respectively receive, as of Our Royal Bounty, the respective Sums expressed in Our said Proclamation (that is to say) every Able Seaman the Sum of Thirty Shillings, and every Ordinary Seaman the Sum of Twenty Shillings, to be paid to them respectively by the Persons, and at the Times, as in Our said Proclamation is mentioned: And We being willing to increase Our said Royal Bounty for the Purposes aforesaid, do hereby promise and declare, That all

Able Seamen who shall, on or before the Thirtieth Day of November next, voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service, in the Manner directed by Our said recited Proclamation, shall receive, as of Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Three Pounds, and all Ordinary Seamen so entering themselves as aforesaid, the Sum of Two Pounds, to be paid in such Manner, and under such Rules and Directions, as are contained in Our said recited Proclamation. And We do hereby promise and declare, that all such Able and Ordinary Seamen, who have entered or may enter themselves into Our Service, on or before the Twenty-first Day of this Instant October, in consequence of Our said Proclamation of the Twenty-second Day of September, shall receive the like Bounty with those who shall enter themselves subsequent to that Time. And We do hereby further promise and declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, shall be paid any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secrete themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our said Service by any of Our Sea Officers employed for raising Men; the said Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen so discovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy; and at the Out-Ports by the Naval Officers (where there are any) and (where there are no Naval Officers) by the Collectors of Our Customs, immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Collectors respectively, by the Person who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names, and Number of Seamen procured in Consequence of his Discovery; the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take such Seaman or Seamen for Our Service.

**W**HEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the 26th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to oblige Ships more effectually to perform their Quarantine, and for the better preventing the Plague being brought from foreign Parts into Great Britain or Ireland, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man," It is among many other Things enacted, That all Ships and Vessels arriving, and all Persons, Goods and Merchandizes whatsoever, coming or imported into any Port or Place within Great Britain or Ireland, or any of the Isles aforesaid, from any Place from whence His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or their Privy Council shall judge it probable that the Infection may be brought, shall be obliged to make their Quarantine, in such Place and Places, for such Time, and in such Manner as has been, or shall, from Time to Time, be directed, by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by His or their Order or Orders, made in

in His or their Privy Council, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette; and that until such Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods and Merchandizes, shall have respectively performed and be discharged from such Quarantine, no such Person, Goods or Merchandizes, or any of them, shall come or be brought on Shore, or go or be put on Board any other Ship or Vessel, in any Place within His Majesty's Dominions, unless in such Manner, and in such Cases, and by such Licence, as shall be directed or permitted by such Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, in Council as aforesaid; and that all such Ships and Vessels, and the Persons or Goods coming or imported in, or going or being put on Board the same; and all Ships, Vessels, Boats and Persons receiving any Goods or Persons out of the same, shall be subject to such Orders, Rules and Directions concerning Quarantine and the Prevention of Infection as have been, or shall be made by His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, in Council, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette as aforesaid, under such Pains and Penalties as are inflicted by the said Act.

And whereas Information hath been received, that the Plague hath broken out, and now rages in Wallachia, Podolia, and other Parts of Poland, and His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth thereupon judge it probable, that the Infection may be brought into this Kingdom, from Dantzick, or some other Port or Place in Royal and Ducal Prussia, or Pomerania; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, that all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods and Merchandizes, now arrived, or that shall hereafter arrive, in any Port of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from Dantzick, or any other Port or Place in Royal and Ducal Prussia, or Pomerania, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days, which is to commence and be computed from the Day each Ship or Vessel shall come to Anchor, in the Place appointed for performing Quarantine, and not before.

That the Place for performing Quarantine by such Ships and Vessels (not having the Infection on Board) as are bound to the Rivers of Thames and Medway, be Standgate Creek; and by such as are bound to any other of the Ports of Great Britain, be such Places as shall be appointed by the Officers of His Majesty's Customs in the said Ports, who are hereby empowered and required to appoint proper Places for the same: And that the Places for performing Quarantine, within any Port of the said Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark or Man, be such Places as shall be appointed by the respective Governors of the said respective Isles, who are hereby empowered and required to appoint proper Places for the same.

That no Pilot shall go on Board any Ship or Vessel obliged to perform Quarantine, in order to conduct the same into any Port or Place, but shall perform such Service in some other Boat or Vessel; which Boat or Vessel shall keep as much to the Windward of the Ship or Vessel so to be conducted as possible: And if any Pilot or other Person shall go on Board such Ship or Vessel, such Pilot or other Person shall perform Quarantine in like Manner as any Person coming in such Ship or Vessel shall be obliged to perform the same.

That all Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, liable to Quarantine as aforesaid, shall be opened, unpacked, and aired, unless His Majesty shall think fit, by His Order in Council, to direct other Ways, and so remain a Week; other than Hemp and Flax, Paper or Books, Silk Raw, Thrown, or Wrought, Linnen, Cotton Wool, Cotton Yarn, or Manufactured, Wool Raw, or any wise Wrought, Feathers, Gro-grain, or Mohair Yarn, Human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmania Wool, Carpets, Camblets, Burdetts, or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton, Kid Skins, and Skins in the Wool or Hair, Spunges, Wine and Oil in Chests, Thread Stockings, all Goods packed with Straw or Cotton, Straw Hats and Brushes, Matting and Artificial Flowers; which Goods and

Merchandizes, so as aforesaid enumerated, are to be opened, unpacked, and aired, unless His Majesty shall think fit, by His Order in Council, to direct otherwise, and so remain for the Space of a Fort-night.

That all Goods imported by such Ships and Vessels as are bound for the Rivers of Thames and Medway, be aired on Board a Floating Lazarette, which is appointed for that Service in Standgate Creek; and that the Places for airing Goods that shall be imported in Ships bound to any other Ports of Great Britain, be such as shall be appointed by the Officers of His Majesty's Customs; and that the Places for airing the Goods imported into any of the said Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, be such Places as shall be appointed by the Governors or Commanders in Chief of the said respective Isles, upon the Spot, who are hereby empowered and required to appoint proper Places for the same.

That whatsoever Ship or Person shall receive any Men or Goods from on Board any Ship or Vessel under Quarantine, shall be compelled to perform the like Quarantine.

That such Persons as, after Quarantine performed, shall be employed in the Hold of any such Ship or Vessel, for the taking any Goods, not liable to retain Infection, from the Goods and Merchandises before enumerated, shall be obliged to perform a new Quarantine.

That the Captains of every of His Majesty's Ships of War, who shall meet any such Ship or Vessel coming to any of the Ports of Great Britain or Ireland, or of the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, shall take due Care to prevent the landing any Goods, Seamen or Passengers, from on Board the same, until they shall be put under the Direction of the Officers of His Majesty's Customs.

That the Commissioners, and other Officers of His Majesty's Customs, do use their utmost Diligence and Care, that the Quarantine, before directed, be duly performed.

That the Commanders of His Majesty's Ships of War, as likewise the Commanders of His Majesty's Forts and Garrisons, lying near the Sea Coasts, and all the Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Chief Magistrates, Constables, Headboroughs, Tything Men, and all other Officers and Ministers of Justice, be aiding and assisting to the said Officers of His Majesty's Customs, and to all others that shall be concerned in stopping all such Ships as aforesaid, and in bringing them to the Places appointed for the Performance of their Quarantine, and in due Performance thereof.

And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being, of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS upon Information received, that the contagious Distemper amongst the Horned Cattle which has for some Time raged in the Dominions of the Kings of Denmark and Sweden, the Dutchies of Holstein, Mecklenburgh and Cleves, the Neighbourhood of Hamburgh, the Frontiers of the United Provinces, and the United Provinces, had extended itself to Flanders;—His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 14th of last Month, to prohibit

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the Importation or Entry of any Cattle, or of any Manner of Hides or Skins, Horns or Hoofs, or any other Part of any Cattle or Beast, from any of the Places aforementioned, into the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland; — His Majesty, for the better Preventing the said Contagious Distemper being brought into these Kingdoms, doth, with the Advice of His Privy Council, judge it necessary to Order, and doth hereby accordingly Order and Command, that no Horned Cattle, nor any Manner of Hides, Skins, Horns, Hoofs or other Part of any Horned Cattle or Beast, nor any Hay, Straw, Litter, Fodder, or other Things, which have been employed about infected Cattle, or the Hides or any other Part of such Cattle, or have been in or near the Places where any such Infection hath been, and are liable to retain the same, shall be Imported from any Ports or other Places within the Dominions and Territories aforementioned, into the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, or any of the Islands or Dominions thereto belonging; — And His Majesty doth further, with the Advice of His Privy Council, strictly Charge and Command, all Magistrates, Constables, Officers of the Customs and Excise, to stop, seize, and destroy, the several Things so prohibited as aforesaid, using and exercising, in that Behalf, the like Authority as any Officer or Officers have, by any Law now in being, in Cases of prohibited and uncustomed Goods. — And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lord Lieutenant of His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

*Lottery-Office, Exchequer, September 24, 1770.*

THE Managers and Directors of the present Lottery think proper to warn all Persons who might otherwise be drawn in to be Adventurers in any private Lotteries here or in Ireland, That by Acts of the 8th Year of His Majesty King George the First, and of the 12th and 26th Years of His late Majesty King George the Second, some or one of them, All and every Person and Persons who shall print, advertise, or publish, Schemes or Proposals for advancing Sums of Money to be decided by the Chances of the Prizes of any publick Lottery or Lotteries established or allowed by Act of Parliament, or deliver out Tickets to the Persons advancing such Sums, to entitle them to a Share of the Money so advanced, according to such Scheme or Proposal, or publish any Scheme or Proposal of the like Nature and Kind, under any Denomination, Name, or Title whatsoever; and any Person who shall sell any Chance in the present State Lottery, or receive any Money whatsoever in Consideration of the Re-payment of any Sum or Sums of Money, in case any Ticket in the said Lottery shall prove fortunate; all and every such Persons being convicted on the Oath or Oaths of one or more credible Witnesses or Witnesses, by two or more Justices of the Peace, will forfeit the several Sums of Five Hundred Pounds and Two Hundred Pounds, as in the said Acts is expressed, over and above all former Penalties; and all and every Person or Persons, who shall be Contributors to, or Adventurers in, any such Sales, Lotteries, Proposals or Schemes aforesaid, will be liable to pay the Sum of Fifty Pounds, and all other the Penalties by Act of Parliament inflicted: And the said Managers and Directors do hereby give publick Notice to all Persons whatsoever, that all Offenders against the said Acts will be prosecuted with the utmost Severity; and for the Information of the Publick, they here insert two Clauses out of an Act of Parliament passed in the 8th Year of His present Majesty, viz. " And be it further enacted, by the Authority aforesaid, that no Person or Persons shall sell the Chance or Chances of any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, or any Share or Shares of any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, for a Day or Part of a Day, or for a longer Time less than the whole Time of drawing the Lot-

tery then to come, or shall receive any Money whatsoever in Consideration of the Re-payment of any Sum or Sums of Money, in Case any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery shall prove fortunate, or shall lay any Wager relating to the drawing of any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, either as to the Time of such Ticket or Tickets being drawn, or whether such Ticket or Tickets be drawn fortunate or unfortunate; and all and every Person and Persons, who shall offend in any of the said Matters, shall forfeit and pay treble the Sum and Sums of Money which shall have been received by such Person and Persons contrary to the true Intent and Meaning of this Act, to be recovered by Action of Debt, Bill, Plaint or Information, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, in which no Escoign, Protection, Privilege or Wager of Law, or more than one Imparlance shall be allowed; one Moiety whereof to be for the Use of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, and the other Moiety to be paid to the Person or Persons who shall sue for the same; and every such Sale, Wager or Contract, and every Agreement relating thereto, shall be, and is hereby declared null and void."

" And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, that if any Person or Persons shall keep any Office or Offices, or shall print or publish any Scheme or Proposal for receiving any Sum or Sums of Money, in Consideration of any Interest to be granted for the same, in any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, whereof such Person or Persons shall not then be actually possessed, or in Consideration of any Sum or Sums of Money to be repayed, in case any Ticket or Number of Tickets in the said Lottery, which shall not be in the actual Possession of such Person or Persons, shall prove fortunate or unfortunate; all and every such Person and Persons shall forfeit and pay the Sum of Five Hundred Pounds, to be recovered by Action of Debt, Bill, Plaint, or Information, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, in which no Escoign, Protection, Wager of Law, or more than one Imparlance shall be allowed; one Moiety whereof to be for the Use of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, and the other Moiety to be paid to the Person or Persons who shall sue for the same, and also shall suffer three Months Imprisonment without Bail or Mainprize.
