WHEREAS His Majesty hath received Information, that the Plague doth at this Time rage with great Violence at Constantinople, and other Parts of the Levant; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth thereupon judge it probable the Infection may be brought into this Kingdom by Ships and Vessels coming from the several Ports in the Mediterranean; and doth therefore, with the Advice aforesaid, order, as it is hereby ordered, that the Quarantine at present subsisting upon all Ships and Vessels coming from the Mediterranean, (except from the Ports of Spain, Minorca, and Gibraltar) or from West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, be extended to all Ships and Vessels whatsoever coming from or through the Mediterranean: And His Majesty, with the Advice aforesaid, doth hereby further order, require, and command, that all Ships and Vessels whatsoever, coming from or through the Mediterranean, and all Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes, on board the same, that are already arrived, or shall hereafter arrive in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days; and do likewise strictly conform themselves, in all Respects, to the Rules and Regulations now in Force, and required to be observed by Ships and Vessels subject to Quarantine. — And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief, for the Time being, of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS Information hath been received that the Plague doth at this Time rage with great Violence at Constantinople and other Parts of the Levant, and in some Parts of Poland — And whereas Rags and Cotton-Wool are Goods more especially liable to retain Infection, and may be brought from the said Places so infected into other Countries, and from thence imported into His Majesty's Dominions in Ships not obliged to perform Quarantine;—His Majesty,

Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, that all Rags or Cotton-Wool, which are or shall be imported into the Rivers of Thames or Medway, in any Ship or Vessel not obliged to perform Quarantine, be immediately put on board an Hoy or other proper Vessel, and sent to Standgate Creek, to be there unpacked, opened, and aired on board the Lazaret appointed for that Purpose, unless His Majesty shall think fit, by His Order in Council, to direct otherwise, and shall there remain for the Space of a Fortnight; and in Case any Rags or Cotton-Wool are or shall be imported in any Ship or Vessel not obliged to perform Quarantine, into any other Port of Great Britain, or the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, that such Ships having such Rags or Cotton-Wool on board, shall not be permitted to land any Part of their Cargoes, until such Rags or Cotton-Wool shall have been taken out of the said Ships, and put on board some proper Vessel or Vessels to be provided for that Purpose, in order to be unpacked, opened, and aired upon the Decks of the said Vessel or Vessels, in the same Manner as is above directed, in Cases of Ships and Vessels arriving in the Rivers of Thames and Medway. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS Information has been received that the Contagious Distemper amongst the Horned Cattle rages in the Regions of the Kings of Denmark and Sweden, the Dutchies of Holstein, Mecklenburgh, and Cleves, in the Neighbourhood of Hamburg, the Frontiers of the United Provinces, the United Provinces, and Flanders, and upon the Coast of France, and that certain Commodities packed in Hay and Straw are frequently brought into these Kingdoms from thence; His Majesty doth thereupon, with the Advice of His Privy Council, find it necessary to order, and doth hereby accordingly order and command, that all Hay or Straw found in any Baskets, Packets or Bales, which may be imported into any of the Ports of Great Britain or Ireland, or any of the Islands and Dominions thereto belonging, from Dunkirk, or any other Part of Flanders, or from the Dominions of the Kings of Denmark and Sweden, the Dutchies of Holstein, Mecklenburgh, and Cleves, the Neighbourhood of Hamburg, the Frontiers of the United Provinces, or the United Provinces, or from any Ports or other Places on the Coast of France, within the Districts of Picardie, Normandie, and Bretagne, be directly burned or destroyed: And His Majesty doth further, with the Advice of His Privy Council, strictly charge and command all Magistrates, Constables, and Officers of the Customs and Excise, to stop, seize and destroy, all Hay and Straw, found in Packages as aforesaid, using and exercising in that Behalf, the like Authority as any Officer or Officers have, by any Law now in being, in Cases of Prohibited and Uncustomed Goods.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lord Lieutenant of His

Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Lottery-Office, Exchequer, September 24, 1770.

THE Managers and Directors of the present Lottery think proper to warn all Persons who might otherwise be drawn in to be Adventurers in any private Lotteries here or in Ireland, That by Acts of the 8th Year of His Majesty King George the First, and of the 12th and 26th Years of His late Majesty King George the Second, some or one of them, All and every Person and Persons who shall print, advertise, or publish, Schemes or Proposals for advancing Sums of Money to be decided by the Chances of the Prizes of any publick Lottery or Lotteries established or allowed by Act of Parliament, or deliver out Tickets to the Persons advancing such Sums, to entitle them to a Share of the Money so advanced, according to such Scheme or Proposal, or publish any Scheme or Proposal of the like Nature and Kind, under any Denomination, Name, or Title whatsoever; and any Person who shall sell any Chance in the present State Lottery, or receive any Money whatsoever in Consideration of the Re-payment of any Sum or Sums of Money, in case any Ticket in the said Lottery shall prove fortunate; all and every such Persons being convicted on the Oath or Oaths of one or more credible Witnesses or Witnessess, by two or more Justices of the Peace, will forfeit the several Sums of Five Hundred Pounds and Two Hundred Pounds, as in the said Acts is expressed, over and above all former Penalties; and all and every Person or Persons, who shall be Contributors to, or Adventurers in, any such Sales, Lotteries, Proposals or Schemes aforesaid, will be liable to pay the Sum of Fifty Pounds, and all other the Penalties by Act of Parliament inflicted: And the said Managers and Directors do hereby give publick Notice to all Persons whatsoever, that all Offenders against the said Acts will be prosecuted with the utmost Severity; and for the Information of the Publick, they here insert two Clauses out of an Act of Parliament passed in the 8th Year of His present Majesty, viz. "And be it further enacted, by the Authority aforesaid, that no Person

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Person or Persons shall sell the Chance or Chances of any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, or any Share or Shares of any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, for a Day or Part of a Day, or for a longer Time less than the whole Time of drawing the Lottery then to come, or shall receive any Money whatsoever in Consideration of the Re-payment of any Sum or Sums of Money, in Case any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery shall prove fortunate, or shall lay any Wager relating to the drawing of any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, either as to the Time of such Ticket or Tickets being drawn, or whether such Ticket or Tickets be drawn fortunate or unfortunate; and all and every Person and Persons, who shall offend in any of the said Matters, shall forfeit and pay treble the Sum and Sums of Money which shall have been received by such Person and Persons contrary to the true Intent and Meaning of this Act, to be recovered by Action of Debt, Bill, Plaint or Information, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, in which no Estoin, Protection, Privilege or Wager of Law, or more than one Imparance shall be allowed; one Moiety whereof to be for the Use of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, and the other Moiety to be paid to the Person or Persons who shall sue for the same; and every such Sale, Wager or Contract, and every Agreement relating thereto, shall be, and is hereby declared null and void."

"And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, that if any Person or Persons shall keep any Office or Offices, or shall print or publish any Scheme or Proposal for receiving any Sum or Sums of Money, in Consideration of any Interest to be granted for the same, in any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, whereof such Person or Persons shall not then be actually possessed, or in Consideration of any Sum or Sums of Money to be repayed, in case any Ticket or Number of Tickets in the said Lottery, which shall not be in the actual Possession of such Person or Persons, shall prove fortunate or unfortunate; all and every such Person and Persons shall forfeit and pay the Sum of Five Hundred Pounds, to be recovered by Action of Debt, Bill, Plaint or Information, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, in which no Estoin, Protection, Wager of Law, or more than one Imparance shall be allowed; one Moiety whereof to be for the Use of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, and the other Moiety to be paid to the Person or Persons who shall sue for the same, and also shall suffer three Months Imprisonment without Bail or Mainprize."
