AT the Court at St. James's, the 1st Day of November, 1770,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 19th of last Month, to direct, that all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes then arrived, or that should thereafter arrive, in any Port of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from Dantzick, or any other Port or Place in Royal and Ducal Prussia, Pomerania, Samogitia, Courland, and Livonia, should make their Quarantine for Forty Days, to commence and be computed from the Day each Ship should come to Anchor in the Place appointed for performing Quarantine, and not before, and should strictly conform themselves, in all Respects, to the Rules and Regulations thereby required to be observed:—His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth judge it probable, that the Infection now raging in divers Parts in Poland may be brought into this Kingdom by Means of sundry Commodities, the Produce of those Places, exported from Hamburgh and Bremen; and doth hereby, with the Advice aforesaid, order, that the Quarantine at present subsisting upon all Ships and Vessels coming from Dantzick, or any other Port or Place in Royal and Ducal Prussia, Pomerania, Samogitia, Courland, and Livonia, be extended to all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes coming from Hamburgh and Bremen:—And His Majesty, with the Advice aforesaid, doth hereby further order, require, and command, that all Ships and Vessels whatsoever coming from Hamburgh or Bremen, and all Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes on Board the same, that are already arrived, or shall hereafter arrive, in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark or Man, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days, and do strictly conform themselves, in all Respects, to the Rules and Regulations now in Force, and required to be observed by Ships and Vessels subject to Quarantine.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant-General and the Rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

HIS Majesty having been pleased to appoint Sir Jeffery Amherst, Knight of the Bath, Lieutenant General of His Majesty's Forces, to be Governor of the Island of Guernsey, he this Day, in

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint Sir William Young, Bart. to be Captain General and Governor in Chief of the Island of Dominica in America, he this Day, in Council, took the Oaths appointed to be taken by the Governors of His Majesty's Plantations.

This Day Their Majesties came from Richmond to the Queen's Palace, to reside during the Winter.

Tunis, October 3. A Peace being now concluded between the French and this State, the French Admiral, M. de Brove, has dispatched all his Squadron for France, except his own Ship and another of 50 Guns, which are to remain here until the Arrival of a Frigate from France with the Ratification of the Peace. The Terms of their Accommodation have not been yet made publick; all that is known at present is, that the Bashaw has given up all the Corsican Slaves that were taken under the French Colours, amounting to Thirty in Number.

Leghorn, October 22. Several ships are arrived here from Alexandria and Smyrna with clean Bills of Health.

Copenhagen, October 27. The Removal of the Court from Hirschholm to Fridricksberg, which was fixed for Saturday last, did not take place till this Day.

Berlin, October 27. On Tuesday the 23d, the King of Prussia, attended by the Prince Royal of Prussia and some General Officers, arrived here from Potsdam. Next Morning his Prussian Majesty exercised the Troops of this Garrison in the Plain of Tempelhoff, in the Presence of his Royal Highness Prince Charles of Sweden; and Thursday last that Monarch returned to Potsdam.

Dresden, October 28. The whole Electoral Family are returned from Pilnitz to this Capital for the Winter.

Rotterdam, November 6. The Accounts about the Plague, both from Warsaw and Dantzick, by the private Letters received this Day, are much more favourable than the last. Letters from Lemberg, of the 10th of October, say, that the Distemper had greatly abated at Caminieck and its Neighbourhood; and that they had the greatest Hopes of the good Effect of the cold Weather.

Brussels, November 6. Sunday last, being the Name Day of his Royal Highness Prince Charles, there was Great Gala at Court; and his Royal Highness received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers upon the Occasion.
