A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS John Duke of Argyll was duly elected and returned to be One of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, to sit in the House of Peers in the present Parliament of Great Britain, and is since deceased; in order to the electing another Peer of Scotland to sit in his Room, We do, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holy Rood House in Edinburgh, on Wednesday the Second Day of January next, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and chuse another Peer of Scotland, to sit and vote in the House of Peers of this present Parliament of Great Britain, in the Room of the said John Duke of Argyll, deceased, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall then be present, and of the Proxies of such as shall be absent (such Proxies being Peers) and producing a Mandate in Writing duly signed before Witnesses, and both Constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law. And the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their Votes; and, immediately after such Election made and duly examined, to certify the Name of the Peer so elected, and sign and attest the same in the Presence of the said Peers, the Electors, and return such Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We strictly charge and command, that this Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns in Scotland, Twenty-five Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to proceed in such Election.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Sixteenth Day of November, One thousand seven hundred and seventy, in the Eleventh Year of Our Reign.

AT the Court at St. James's, the 16th Day of November, 1770,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 1st Instant, to order, that for the better preventing the Infection, now raging at Constantinople and other Parts of the Levant, and in some Parts of Poland, from being brought into this Kingdom, all Ships and Vessels whatsoever, having Rags or Cotton-Wool on Board, which were then arrived, or should thereafter arrive, in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark or Man, should make their Quarantine for Forty Days, and should likewise strictly conform themselves, in all Respects, to the Rules and Regulations now in Force, and required to be observed by Ships and Vessels subject to Quarantine.— And whereas it hath been represented to His Majesty at this Board, that several Ships are arrived, and others are expected to arrive, from America and the West Indies, with Cotton-Wool on Board, which Ships may be supposed liable to Quarantine by the aforementioned Order in Council

— His Majesty, taking the same into Consideration, and being desirous to remove all Doubts, and to prevent Obstructions upon Trade, so far as may be consistent with the Health and Safety of His Subjects, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, that all Ships and Vessels already arrived, or that shall hereafter arrive, from America or the West Indies, with Rags or Cotton-Wool on Board, the Produce of those Places, be not laid under any Restraint whatsoever on Account of Quarantine.— And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief, for the Time being, of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in His Privy Council.

WHEREAS James Rylatt, of Chappel-hill, in the Parish of Swineshead, in the Parts of Holland, in the County of Lincoln, Grazier, was, upon the Sixth Day of this Instant November, charged by Information of a credible Person upon Oath, by him subscribed, before Henry Butler Pacey, Esquire, and the Reverend John Calthrop, Clerk, two of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the Parts of Holland, in the said County of Lincoln, with having been guilty, on or about the Sixth Day of September, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-nine, in the Night, of entering on Lands belonging to Charles Anderson Pelham, Esquire, late Part of Holland Fen, in the said Part, allotted to the said Charles Anderson Pelham, by the Commissioners chosen to divide the said Fen, and there with a Gun loaded with Shot, unlawfully and maliciously shooting at some of the horned Cattle then grazing on the said Lands, which not doing the Execution intended, he the said James Rylatt, being on the said Lands, did then load the same Gun with Pebble Stones, with which Gun so loaded with Pebble Stones, he the said James Rylatt, being on the said Lands, did then and there unlawfully and maliciously shoot at the said Cattle so grazing on the said Lands, and by so shooting, he the said James Rylatt did kill one of the said Cattle so grazing on the said Lands as aforesaid; which Beast so killed was of the horned Kind, of a Red Colour, and either a Steer or Heifer; which Information was afterwards certified by the said Henry Butler Pacey, and John Calthrop, under their Hands and Seals, to one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who has laid the same before His Majesty in His Privy Council, pursuant to the Act of Parliament of the Ninth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the First, in that Case made and provided: His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by this His Order in His Privy Council, require and command, that the said James Rylatt do and shall Surrender himself, within the Space of Forty Days, to one of the Justices of His Majesty's Court of King's Bench,

or to one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, to the End that he may be forthwith coming to answer the Offence wherewith he stands charged by the said Information, according to due Course of Law. And His Majesty is pleased further to order, as it is hereby ordered, that this Order shall be printed and published in the next London Gazette, and shall be forthwith transmitted to the Sheriff of the said County of Lincoln; and that the said Sheriff shall, within Six Days after the Receipt thereof, by himself or his Officers, proclaim the same Order, between the Hours of Ten in the Morning and Two in the Afternoon, in the Market-places, upon the respective Market-Days, of two Market-Towns in the said County of Lincoln, near to the Place where the said Offence was committed; and shall cause a true Copy of this Order to be affixed upon some public Place in each of such Market-Towns, according to the true Intent and Meaning of the said Act of Parliament, in that Case made and provided.

Resolved and Ordered, That the Sum of Forty Shillings for every Able Seaman, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, over and above the Bounty granted by His Majesty, be given, during the Pleasure of this Court, and not exceeding one Month from this Day, to every such Seaman that shall enter at the Guildhall of this City into the Service of His Majesty's Navy.

The following Bounties have been offered by the undermentioned Cities and Towns, to encourage Seamen to enter voluntarily into His Majesty's Service.

- City of Bristol. Twenty Shillings to every Able, and Fifteen Shillings to every Ordinary Seaman.
- Town of Montrose. Two Guineas to every Able, and One Guinea to every Ordinary Seaman.
- City of Edinburgh. The same Bounty as the Town of Montrose.
- Town of Aberdeen. One Guinea to every Seaman; and Fifteen Shillings to every Landman.
- Town of Cambeltown. Twenty Shillings to every Able Seaman.
- Town of Lynn. One Guinea to every Able Seaman.

Portsmouth, November 15.

The infectious Fever with which the Crew of the Dutch East-India Ship, the Yffelmonde, lying at Spithead, bound to Batavia, were afflicted, is so far abated, and the Ship's Company so much recovered, that the Captain intends to sail Tomorrow Morning, if the Wind continues Easterly; and, upon the strictest Enquiry, it appears, that no Person, either at Gosport or Fareham, has caught the Distemper from Groves or Cousins, the two Custom-house Officers, who had done Duty on board the said Ship, and are since dead at those Places.

Rotterdam, Nov. 13. Advices from Rochelle say, that such heavy Rains had fallen in that and the neighbouring Provinces, that it was feared they would not be able to sow their Corn; neither had the Vintage in general turned out as well as was hoped.

Naples, October 16. A slight Shock of an Earthquake was felt here on Saturday last; and upon Mount Vesuvius the Shocks have been frequent of late; the Volcano has for some Days past thrown up a Quantity of Fire and Smoke. It is very probable there will shortly be an Eruption.

Dublin, November 6.

Sunday last being the Anniversary of the Birth of the late King William the Third, of glorious Memory, in the Morning the Flag was displayed on Birmingham Tower; the Great Guns in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired three Rounds,

and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks. And Yesterday at Noon there was a splendid Appearance of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction, at the Castle, to compliment his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant; after which his Excellency, attended by the Nobility and Gentry, and escorted by a Squadron of Horse, went in Procession round the Statue of King William, the Regiments on Dublin Duty lined the Statue on each Side; and after his Excellency's Return to the Castle, the Great Guns at the Salute Battery, in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix, were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn up in College Green; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.
