GEORGE R.

THEREAS John Duke of Argyll was duly elected and returned to be One of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, to fit in the House of Peers in the present Parfament of Great Britain, and is fince deceased; in order to the electing another Peer of Scotland to fit in his Room, We do, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, iffue forth this Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to alemble and meet at Holy Rood House in Edinburgh, on Wednesday the Second Day of January next, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and chuse another Peer of Scotland, to fit and vote in the House of Peers of this present Parliament of Great Britain, in the Room of the faid John Duke of Argyll, deceafed, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Petr that shall then be present, and of the Proxies of such as shall be absent (such Proxies being Peers) and producing a Mandate in Writing duly signed before Witnesses, and both Constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law. And the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the principal Clerks of the Seffion as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to atand finch Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the faid Peers, and to take their Votes; and, immediately after fuch Election made and duly examined, to certify the Name of the Peer fo elected, and fign and atteff fame in the Presence of the said Peers, the Eleftors, and return such Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of G. eat Britain. And We andly charge and command, that this Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns in Scotland, Twenty-fre Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to proceed in such

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. Hereas His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 1st Instant, to order, that for the better preventing the Infection, now nging at Constantinople and other Parts of the Levant, and in some Parts of Poland, from being broads into this Victorian and Vessels hought into this Kingdom, all Ships and Veffels whatever, having Rags or Cotton-Wool on Board, which were then arrived, or should thereafter arrive, in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or of the lifes of leafer County and Man, should in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or of the liles of Jeney, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark or Man, should must their Quarantine for Forty Days, and should likewise strictly conform themselves, in all Respects, to the Rules and Regulations now in Force, and required to be observed by Ships and Vessels subject to Quarantine.—And whereas it hath been represented to His Majosty at this Board, that several Ships are arrived, and others are expected to arrive, from America and the West Indies, with Cotton-Wood on Board, which Ships may be supposed liable to Quarantine by the aforementioned Order in Coun-MANUA PAR PER Pence. 1

cil - His Majesty, taking the same into Considera-tion, and being desirous to remove all Doubts, and to prevent Obstructions upon Trade, so far as may be consistent with the Health and Sasety of His Subjects, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, that all Ships and Vessels already arrived, or that shall hereafter arrive, from America or the West Indies, with Rags or Cotton-Wool on Board, the Produce of those Places, be not laid under any Restraint whatsoever on Account of Quarantine.— And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majefty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief, for the Time being, of the faid respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS James Rylatt, of Chappel-hill, in the Parish of Swineshead, in the Parts of Holland, in the County of Lincoln, Grazier, was, upon the Sixth Day of this Instant November, charged by Information of a credible Person upon Oath, by him subscribed, before Henry Butler Pacey, Esquire, and the Reverend John Calthrop, Clerk, two of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the Parts of Holland, in the said County of Lincoln, with having been guilty, on or about the Sixth Day of September, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-nine, in the Night, of entering on Lands belonging to Charles Anof entering on Lands belonging to Charles Anderson Pelham, Esquire, late Part of Holland Fen, in the said Part, allotted to the said Charles Anderson Pelham, by the Commissioners chosen to divide the said Fen, and there with a Gan loaded with Shot, unlawfully and maliciously shooting at some of the horned Cattle then grazing on the said Lands, which not doing the Execution intended, he the said James Rylatt, being on the said Lands, did then load the same Gun on the faid Lands, did then load the fame Gun with Pebble Stones, with which Gun fo leaded with Pebble Stones, he the faid James Rylatt, being on the faid Lands, did then and there unlawfully and maliciously shoot at the said Cattle so grazing on the said Lands, and by so shooting, he the said James Rylatt did kill one of the said Cattle so grazing on the said Lands as aforesaid; which Beast so killed was of the horned Kind, of a Red Colour, and either a Steer or Heiser; which Information was afterwards certified by the said Henry Butlet Pacey, and John Calthrop. faid Henry Butler Pacey, and John Calthrop, under their Hands and Seals, to one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who has laid the same before His Majesty in His Privy Council; pursuant to the Act of Parliament of the Ninth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the First, in that Case made and provided. His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by this His O'der in His Privy Council, require and command, that the faid James Rylatt do and shall Surrender himself, within the Space of Forty Days, to one of the Justices of His Majesty's Court of King's Bench,
