It is His Majesty's Pleasure, that all Officers, belonging to His Land Forces, serving in Ireland, do immediately repair to their respective Posts in that Kingdom, except such as are employed in the Recruiting Service.

BARON Nolcken, Envoy Extraordinary from his Swedish Majesty, having notified to me, by Order of his Court, that, on Account of the Plague raging in the Levant and in some Parts of Europe, no Ships or Travellers whatsoever would be admitted into the Ports or Frontiers of Sweden, without proper Bills of Health; this is to give Notice to all Owners and Masters of Ships, and others whom it may concern, that they may apply to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, and to the Principal Officers of the Customs in the Outports, for such Bills of Health.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twelfth Day of October last, to promise and declare, amongst other Things, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Two Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to every such Seaman respectively, who should, on or before the Thirtieth Day of this Instant, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds should be also paid to any Person who should, on or before the said Thirtieth Day of this Instant, discover any Seaman or Seamen who should conceal themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service. And whereas the Time thereby limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards is now near expiring; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some longer Time; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited by the said Proclamation for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said 30th Day of this Instant November, to the 31st Day of December next, inclusive. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Berlin, November 17. The King of Prussia has created Baron de Furst Great Chancellor in all his Dominions, in the room of M. de Jariges, who died here some Days ago, much regretted, in the 64th Year of his Age.

The last Letters from Petersbourg mention, that on the 28th of October the Empress of Russia had decorated, with her own Hands, Prince Henry of Prussia with the Order of St. Andrew, richly ornamented with Jewels. The same Letters add, that her Imperial Majesty had likewise made a Present of Furs to his Royal Highness of a very considerable Value.

Rotterdam, November 20. By a Proclamation issued by the King of Denmark, the Exportation of Wheat, Rye, Barley, Buck Wheat, Pease, Beans, Malt, and Meal, from the Dutchies of Holstein and Sleswick, and Lordships of Pinnenburg, Raudtzau, and Altona, by Sea or Land, is prohibited, except to the Kingdoms of Denmark and Norway.

The Distemper of the Black Cattle begins to decrease in Maritime Flanders, but rages with great Violence in the Country about Ghend, and in most Parts of the Province of Brabant.

The Prohibition of the Exportation of Corn, &c. from the Austrian Netherlands, is renewed.
